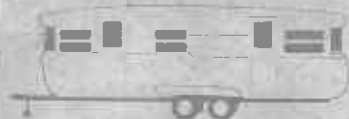

NOTICE TO ADVERTISERS

PENALTY:

For an individual \$10,000 or 6 months imprisonment.

For a corporation \$50,000

It is not possible for this company to ensure that advertisements which are published in this magazine comply with the Act. The responsibility must therefore be on the person, company or advertising agency submitting the advertisements for publication.

48TH ANNUAL REPORT — 1978 SEASON

Gentlemen,

Your Executive has much pleasure in reporting upon those activities and highlights of the Club during the season recently concluded.

COMPETITION RESULTS

The 1978 Season provided our Club with some of the finest exhibitions of Team Spirit, unflagging will-to-win and skilful and gutsy Rugby that have been seen for many a day, culminating in the magnificent Grand Finals of both Fourth and Reserve Grades, with the Firsts, Under 19s and Under 18s only missing a semi-final spot each by the narrowest of margins. We will not forget, either, the courage and the frequently fine games played by the Thirds and the Under 19 Bs, each of these teams albeit suffering severely and frequently by the incidence of academic examinations and the unavoidable loss of regular players to other grades. The record established by the Fourths in maintaining an undefeated position and having their line crossed only 3 times during the season and the tremendous Grand Final game by Reserve Grade are each worthy of very special commendation and congratulation to players and coaches alike.

One does not shut one's eyes to the unhappy fact that sometimes a team played poorly, and there is little doubt that the Firsts appeared the more frequently in this position in crucial games during the second half of the season, and the strange and transient losses of interest, team spirit and loyalty to coach, team-mates and club are hard to understand, particularly so in the light of brilliant and sharply contrasting performances in succeeding games. There is no need to labor the short-comings; those concerned know all about it already. It is however pertinent and constructive to make the observation that the team and club spirit was best shown consistently by players who also worked regularly on projects beneficial to the club as a whole, and, in the process of the soul-searching and corrective action so necessary to re-build soundly the fabric of Club Spirit, due and appreciative note should be taken in particular of the Fourths, the Juniors and our New Zealander contingent; the latter very clearly came to our club imbued with the attitude of New Zealand Rugby players — when you join a club you work for it as well as play for it.

CLUB HOUSE

Members made good use of the fine facilities of the Club House, both in regard to Functions and after-match and after-training social activity, albeit it was disappointing at times to have poor back-to-Ashgrove support on Sunday evenings after "away" games. It is hoped that the room-divider curtain now in position will assist in this regard and give that part of the Club House in use on Sunday nights a "cosier" atmosphere. A number of improvements were made during the year, including new doors and modifications of walls in the change-rooms, the room-divider, top dressing and fertilising of the fields, more training lights, notice-boards, the purchase of 2 "rain-train" watering units, the "Coca-Cola" kiosk, and greatest of all in magnitude, utility and appearance, the multiple terracing in front of the Club House under the skilful and untiring direction of Peter McBaron, and his gangs of G.P.S. and Valley Cricket workers; a tremendously successful and much admired development of which we can all be proud. The meetings, thoughts and efforts of the Combined Committee, that chosen band of stalwarts from each Valleys District Cricket Club and our Club, who are responsible for putting into effect and administering most of the Club House and Environs developments deservedly have earned the thanks and admiration of us all. The thanks of this Club are offered too to our partners in Ashgrove, The Valleys District Cricket Club, for their friendly and active co-operation.

Surely, the 1978 season should have been the year for G.P.S. to re-construct its position in Brisbane Rugby, especially after the failures endured in the past four years, and the humiliation of being dubbed as no-hopers, but unfortunately, no-one took any notice of the decline, hence the dismal performance of our first grade side this year.

I would much rather have been Coach of a winning side, or at least of a side that was impressive in defeat, but as you all know, this is not the case.

As we all know also, it is one thing to be beaten against odds, but it is another to let one's code down in face of inferior opposition.

In spite of our early successes in the first round, the firsts never looked like premiership material. The Club lost too many of its top grade players, and just did not have the depth to replace them. TREASURER'S REPORT

R. A. Anderson

I present for your consideration and adoption the Club's audited Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Statement for the year ended 31st August, 1978.

The Club has completed its second season and has actually been located at Ashgrove now for almost two years.

The further improvements made to facilities at Ashgrove during the year are major improvements for club members. In particular, a further two field lights were added at a cost of \$1,178. In addition, terracing and landscaping and top dressing of the fields which respectively cost \$2,489 and \$5,432 was carried out by the Joint Committee. Subsidies at the rate of one dollar for every three dollars of qualifying expenditure was received from the Ministry of Sport in respect of the field lights and the top dressing. However, the increased expenses of these facilities together with generally higher charges has again resulted in major increases in many costs during the year. This expenditure further stretched the Club's resources. The balance sheet at 31st October, 1978 of the Joint Venture between the two clubs is attached to this report and financial statement.

The collection of members subscriptions as usual was very difficult. A further seven members have subscribed for Ashgrove Ground Membership. The committee again requests that urgent support be given by all members in all categories. Subscriptions are intended for the running of the Club and this will require even greater expenditure during 1979 year.

The Finance Sub-Committee of the Management Committee continued to operate for the purposes of organising and conducting fund raising activities to assist the Club in meeting its commitments to Valley District Cricket Club.

This Committee and the Club urgently needs further strong support of members, past and present, and supporters to raise the funds to meet the liability of \$34,110 and for other expenditures now being planned. The commitment to Valley District Cricket Club is a major restriction on the further development of the impressive Ashgrove clubhouse and grounds. If this liability is extinguished, the club can commit all its resources towards the developments that have been proposed and sought after for a number of years. Your assistance is required and requested in every way possible.
