## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Club had a disappointing year on the playing field. We failed to make the final five in the "A" Grade club competition. Sure, we had nine 1-pointers; we scored the second largest number of tries; David Green scored the most points by a large margin, but in David's own words, "we gave away too many penalties which our opposition turned into points".

Our coaches, John Garde and Trevor Jesser, worked very hard all season, but the players lacked the commitment that is required to win premierships. I have no doubt that the talent is there, as was shown in the wins against Souths and Wests, and the last game against the premiers, University, but the game against University said it all — we scored 3 tries to 1 and came off the field losing 19 points to 17, Palm kicking 5 penalties.

The performance of the "A" Grade side influences the performances in the lower grades. The 2nd Grade's problems were compounded by their coach, Bob Beattie, being unable to complete his commitment and retiring from coaching at the beginning of the last round. Again, the talent was there. Chris Carberry was able to demonstrate this when he stepped in as coach for most of the final round.

The 3rd Grade never settled down after Mark Oberhardt found he couldn't continue coaching towards the end of the first round because of work commitments on the weekend. Ken Bolton, Paul Green and Robin Thomson tried to keep the team together, and under these trying conditions the 3rd Grade met its commitments throughout the season.

Robin Thomson's 4th Grade side made the finals. It wasn't lack of spirit that let them down in the last game.

The 5th Grade retired from the competition half way through the season, despite the hard work of Brian Meehan. To some extent, it was another Expo casualty, a factor which affected the Club in many ways.

I have demonstrated with the Q.R.U. about the length of the competition — there are some 24 games for the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Grades. The club competition seemed to be low on their list of priorities, and in the 1989 season, the Q.R.U. have introduced Sunnybank into the "A" Grade competition. This will be done by having two rounds of eight games, two byes, and a split round at the end.

Our thanks go to Paul Green, the single senior selector who watched every game throughout the season, and who chaired a very constructive selection committee.

The performance of the Colts teams went against the trend in the senior grades. The 1st Grade team made the finals and were a good side, ably coached by Brad Butten and managed by Benny Greenhill. Injuries to key players were a disappointment to the players, and I am sure this affected the final outcome.

The 2nd Grade team, coached by Steve Meehan and managed by Brendan Moore, won the premiership. The grand final was a nail-biting affair, being saved from certain defeat by a magnificent tackle from James Boreham (the Shark). The team were the premiership leaders going into the finals, and deserved their premiership – they wanted to win!

The 3rd Grade Colts won some good games, but did not have the size or the skills of some of the teams in this lop-sided competition. Our thanks go to Greg Mee and Clinton Busteed who organised and coached this team throughout the season.

The organisation of the whole Colts competition was a disgrace to the Q.R.U. with the 1st and 2nd Grades ultimately playing two rounds of five games each, with two byes in each round. The 3rd Grade was divided into two groups of six teams.

On the representative scene, Anthony Herbert played for Queensland, and is in the team to go to Argentina. A big disappointment is that he didn't make the Wallaby team. Performance on the field is obviously the way to influence selectors – the two teams who played in the grand final, University and Souths, each had eight and seven players respectively selected for the Queensland team to go to Argentina.

Michael Frisby played very well for Queensland "B", and David Green was picked for the Queensland Under 21 side. In the Colts, David Newstead was a State and Metropolitan selector and coached the Metropolitan side. Five players made the Queensland Under 19 side – Michael Ware, Rohan Lawrence, Chris O'Reilly, Jason Carswell and Steve Smith. A great disappointment for the Colts this year was the Q.R.U.'s decision not to fund the Annual Colts Tour to New Zealand.

The Club had a disappointing financial year. Sponsorships were hard to get, and Expo soaked up the disposable dollars of many of the Club's supporters. We were rescued to a great extent by a sponsorship of \$30,000 from Bill James, a former player who is heavily involved in the real estate scene on the Gold Coast. My particular thanks go to Lance Phillips who worked very hard throughout the season and gave me wonderful support. His Treasurer's Report details the financial position of the Club.

The Club has been successful in negotiating with the Q.A.F.L. and the Brisbane City Council for the head lease of the playing fields next to Valleys at Yoku Road. The lease is subject to a sub-lease to Valleys Cricket Club in the Summer, and Ashgrove G.P.S. Rugby Club in conjunction with ourselves in the Winter. I would like to thank Alderman Brian Hallinan, Robin Thomson and Lance Phillips for their assistance with the negotiations for this lease. The whole project would not have been possible if the purchase price of \$50,000 had not been underwritten by Athol Flynn and his committee of Old Boys. To the date of writing this report, \$32,000 has been raised, and Athol is confident that the target will be achieved.

The incorporation of the Club was finalised during the year, and our thanks go to Robin Thomson for his patience and perseverance during this project.

Bill Elvers assisted the coaches throughout the season with a well-balanced fitness program. David Phillips has organised a modern weight shed in the old Aussie Rules Clubhouse, and he hopes that the weights will get a lot of use during the off season. I would like to thank the ladies who worked so hard in the canteen for the home games. The Club didn't involve the ladies nearly enough in many of its activities. However, one lady who did get involved in the Club's activities is Dr Leah Phillips, who acted in an honorary capacity. Dr Phillips attended the home games and applied many stitches, and gave our players plenty of sound advice as to the correct medical treatment they should seek.

Roger Dent, the Club's Providor, deserves special thanks for the many hours he spent at the Club. Our thanks also go to Donna Harvey, the Club's physio-therapist who also acted as a strapper for the senior grades on many occasions.

Your Committee met every three weeks throughout the season. Particular thanks should go to Ken Bolton who was responsible for the grounds being marked for every home game, and for the thick cover of grass that is seldom seen at Yoku Road. Ken also acted as Club Registrar. My thanks also go to the Club's Secretary, Andrew Dawson, who also liaised with the Colts when Arthur Earle, the Junior Vice-President, retired after some good work at the beginning of the season.

Barry Darwin, Brogan Melit and Brian Downs also worked very hard throughout a very difficult season for the Club.

## "A" GRADE REPORT

It was an up and down season. We started well with some promising wins and finished with a brilliant victory over Wests and a very good performance against eventual premiers, University. In the middle of the season some inconsistent and below par performances cost us dearly.

There was no doubt in our minds that the team has the ability to beat any team in the competition at any time. Our results for the season against the eventual premiers gives an indication of the ability in the team — we scored five tries to two over the three fixtures. However, to be premiership contenders we have to be more consistent and perform to our ability in every game. This season we lost nine games by less than six points. But a premiership team narrowly wins close matches instead of narrowly losing them.

The question is how to maintain the level of performance we sometimes reach. The answer must be our approach to training and the commitment from all players to practise the skills required to be a good rugby player. When the skills are learnt and practised regularly the response to tight situations on the field becomes automatic. With everyone prepared properly each match can be approached with confidence and undoubtedly, give the talent he has, the results will follow. This season we lacked the required effort from some and an opportunity was lost.

This year the club provided a professional trainer in Billy Elvers. Bill's training was hard at times but those who really followed his program benefited. Fitness is an area in which the whole club could improve dramatically with some hard work, and an enthusiastic approach to the type of training Billy provided. The club has installed an excellent weights room to enhance our prospects next season. David Phillips has done a fine job in organising this facility which is already in use by a group of dedicated trainers.

The season was an enjoyable experience. Being inexperienced coaches we made mistakes but learnt as we went along. In the end we were starting to feel more comfortable about our positions. Our thanks to all the players for their support and, in particular, our leaders, Sela Gutugutawai and Anthony Herbert. Their approach to training and playing was an example to others.

The season was marred by serious injuries to Andrew Powell and Neil Tobitts. A promising representative career was cut short by Andrew's injury, but at least he is still a keen supporter and club member. Neil will be back next season.

Congratulations to players selected in representative teams — A. Powell (Queensland), A. Herbert (Queensland, Australia B), Mick Frisby (Queensland B), David Phillips (Brisbane) and Stuart Morris (Brisbane). Also to David Greene for being the competition's leading point scorer. We have several other fringe rep players and a better team performance will bring them to prominence.

Our thanks to Ed Given and Brogan Melit for their help during the season, and to the loyal supporters who stuck with us through good and bad times.

## ASHGROVE GPS JUNIORS

## TREASURER'S REPORT

The past year has been most exciting for GPS Rugby due to the acquisition of the Ashgrove number two oval, formerly leased by the QAFL. It is my opinion that GPS is now capable of developing into one of the strongest rugby clubs in Brisbane if members, players and supporters band together and capitalise on the facilities of three playing fields, club rooms etc. now at their disposal under the sub-lease of Ashgrove number one and the new head lease of Ashgrove number two oval.

To achieve this goal in the next couple of years there are, in my opinion, two income avenues which should be addressed by the incoming committee –

A) sponsorship and advertising;

B) functions and fund-raising.

There is a need for more professionalism in the committee's approaches to these income items. They are the only avenues on our income side that can be increased substantially enough to cover both the increases in running costs of the club and capital improvements to our leasehold buildings and ovals.

On the expenditure side the item that warrants concern is the amount of \$6,677 for players' import expenses. It is my opinion that unless direct sponsorship to cover this particular type of expenditure is available, then the incoming committee should be cautious in its approaches to undertaking such future projects.

In conclusion, may I extend to the incoming committee and players every success in their respective endeavours on behalf of the club. At the same time I sincerely thank all members who have assisted me during my two years as treasurer, in particular Alan Taylor, Keith Sloggett, Tony Heeson and Robin Thomson, and a very special thank you to Roger Dent.

## NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. The increase in the income item was due to the profits from the Golden Oldies Week Rugby Festival in July.
2. The decrease was mainly due to no Art Union being organised in 1988, as was promoted in 1987 to assist the Club Tour of Fiji.
3. General sponsorships and donations were down by some \$10,000 this year, after deducting the magnificent sponsorship of \$30,000 mentioned elsewhere in this Annual Report, and \$1,600 donated specifically towards the acquisition of the Clubhouse and development of the Ashgrove No. 2 Oval and \$1,300 towards the weights apparatus.
4. The clothing loss increase was due mainly to two factors:
  - (i) the purchase of five new sets of club jerseys;
  - (ii) the non-collection of shorts and socks sales to members and the non-reimbursement from Colts membership fees to cover new Colts clothing costs.
5. This expense covers return air fares for three players imported from Fiji plus housing and associated costs during the season.
6. This weight apparatus item represents the market value of the gymnasium equipment not previously included in these accounts, and subsequently traded-in on updated equipment (refer Note 8).
7. Ashgrove No. 2 Oval improvements include \$50,000 purchase price, approximately \$3,100 installation cost of a Cold Room, and approximately \$700 on security doors, locks, etc.
8. This amount represents the purchase of new weights apparatus (refer Note 3).
9. Sundry creditors include the amount of \$23,000 owing to the QAFL as at 31/10/88 of the acquisition price of \$50,000 for the Ashgrove No. 2 Oval improvements.
10. The loans of \$32,000 are the members' and supporters' interest-free loans received as at 31/10/88 under the sponsors' loan agreement.

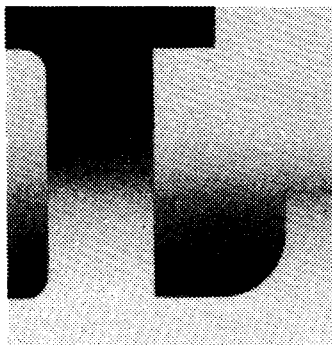
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
