#### Gentlemen,

Your executive has much pleasure in reporting upon the activities of the Club during the past season.

The 1971 season was perhaps one of the more successful enjoyed by the Club in recent years there being substantial achievements both on and off the field. For the second time in two years Club membership and support increased to such an extent that an additional team was able to be fielded - on the occasion an Under 18 side. Coupled with this was the success on the field throughout the Club resulting in every team reaching the final four, but unfortunately premiership honours eluded all.

Once again the under age teams set the example as each contested the Grand Final and both teams are to be congratulated, particularly the Under 18 side which accomplished this in their first season. The great promise shown by these two teams must point to successful seasons ahead and it is to be hoped that continued recruiting of junior players will further strengthen both grades.

With the exception of fourth grade which suffered defeat at the hands of Univeristy in the second semi-final, all other teams reached the finals only to finish the season at that point. Players of some grades may have felt cheated by the results but it is evident that Grand Finals are won only by those teams that produce consistently good Rugby throughout the season.

In the administration of the Club your Management Committee has been active. The publication of "The Gallopers" Gazette has continued for which the editor and his assistants are to be congratulated on their enterprise, and from all reports the visit to Lismore eclipsed that of the previous year. By next season the long awaited Clubhouse extensions will have been completed, while it can be seen from the Treasurer's Report that Club assets and membership have increased substantially during the year. However complacency is the enemy of progress and if the Club is to continue to prosper a concerted effort by all members and supporters is the minimum requirement.

Again the Club has been fortunate in having the Ladies Committee at the helm of our social functions and we thank them for their efforts on our behalf. This energetic band of workers, whose contribution to the Club is largely unrecognised, each year acquit their task with enthusiasm and we look forward to their continued support in the coming year.

We thank our Club Coaches David Clark, Dick Roberts, Peter Daley, Dowell O'Reilly, Jim Dalgleish and Onus Maynes as well as our Registrar, Selectors and Team Managers for their efforts and perseverance throughout the season.

We also thank Mr. B. Loel for his generous contribution to the Club in the laundering of jerseys.

## FIRST GRADE TEAM REPORT - DAVID CLARK

1971 - A year for disappointment, a year of triumph.

After our performance in 1970, when we were Minor Premiers, Welsby Cup holders, Brothers conquerors and Grand Finalists, it would seem to follow that 1971 could only be better, but this was not to be.

Many factors contributed to our unfortunate demise, the greatest being complacency and lack of dedication, the former being a coach's greatest enemy. Let me say from the outset that I was not at all disappointed at the later stage of the season in the manner we played our football; but the damage had already been done against such teams as Souths and Teachers in the first round. These games were poorly played and cost us a Grand Final appearance. Surely the lesson to be learnt is play every game as a grand final and play to win. Good mental approach is all important.

Our game in the semi-final against University was probably equal to, if not better than the Brothers game in 1970. It showed that we are capable of great football. Next year this Club wants a Grand Final win. It is the duty of every player who aspires to 1st Grade to work for it with untiring zeal and bottomless dedication.

Our Club lost something when Graham Fear was transferred to Bangkok and he has been sadly missed for his unflagging effort both at training and playing. It was also most unfortunate the have Lloyd Graham return from the Queensland game in Sydney with an injury that kept him out for weeks, but very heartening to see his great return to form in the last matches of the season and it is to be hoped he will continue with this form next season.

We were served well by 25 players during the year and it must be remembered that certain positions were very keenly contested. #### TREASURER'S REPORT - by I.H. Fraser

I present for your consideration, and if thought fit, adoption at the Annual General Meeting, the Club's audited Statement of Receipts and Payments for the year ended 31st October 1971.

The Statement shows a balance of funds at 31st October of \$4958.50. However, the Club has a committment for capital expenditure in the form of Finsbury Park Clubhouse extensions at \$2,500.00.

A record number of 190 members was financial in 1971 (Patron, 12 Life Members, 140 Senior Members, 37 Junior Members). However, this number does not compare favourably with the total number of members circularised with the Club newsletter, "The Gallopers' Gazette", of 375. Two members have paid subscriptions in advance for the 1972 Season (\$14.00).

The Club operated profitably in all activities during the season. Contributions to the Clubhouse trading and Socials profit came from liquor sales, soft drinks sales, pie sales, punch board operations and the various socials and barbeques conducted throughout the season.

I would like to pay tribute to the small but willing band of members who helped in the financial affairs of the Club and, in particular, to Robin Thomson for his enterprise, drive and dedication. I am sorry that I will not be able to continue my association with the Club in the next two years but I wish the Club and its members every success in the future.
