45TH ANNUAL REPORT - 1975 SEASON

Gentlemen,

Your Executive has much pleasure in reporting upon those activities and highlights of the Club during the season recently concluded not already covered in the latest issue of "The Galloper's Gazette".

COMPETITION RESULTS

This was another really great year for the Club, and once more our great strength in depth was well in evidence as the detailed results appearing later in this Report and the Trophy Pennants in the Club House show. With all four Club competition teams making the Finals, three of them the Grand Finals, the magnificent Premiership win by Reserve Grade, the winning of the Club Competition itself and our Representative selections, we can indeed feel proud of our players and their coaches. Our Club Premiership represents a great joint effort involving probably some 70 players, 4 Coaches and the Selectors. Our Fifth Graders enjoyed themselves as is their custom, winning a respectable total, and it was great to see their own particular depth of available players.

Our two Under 19 teams did very well, with the B's almost making the semis, and there is much talent amongst these young players; pleasing State Representation from their ranks was a notable feature too.

I would very much like to see more Supporters along on Saturdays during the playing season to help lift the Under 19's to even greater efforts. It really does help tremendously to have support.

We are especially proud too of David Hillhouse in his Wallaby selection, and there is no doubt that by the A.G.M. we and the rest of the Rugby world will have seen and heard great things of our "Hector". At time of writing he has already "played the big one" in the Oxford game.

CLUB HOUSE

The Clubhouse, its atmosphere and traditions, mean much to all of us and, very obviously, this atmosphere of a true Rugby Club is much admired by Visitors from other Clubs, Interstate and Overseas.

The subject of our proposed move involving a new Clubhouse and bigger and better fields, etc. is the subject of a separate report. Suffice it to say here that the proposal bears both my earnest recommendation and a categorial assurance that very great care has been taken in the planning and design to maintain in detail those things for which we all have so much affection at Finsbury.

OUR LATE PATRONS

Within the span of a few months we suffered the very unhappy loss of our great successive Patrons, Arthur Dibdin and Harry Edwards. Great G.P.S. men, great Rugby men, great and generous friends to so many.

Our tributes and deep regrets have been expressed in personal channels and in issues of "The Galloper's Gazette".

FINANCE

The report of the Treasurer, together with the accounts, appear later in this Report. It will be apparent that the financial ramifications and activities of the Club have placed it from some years past in the category of quite a substantial business. That we are able to operate so successfully on this scale is a tribute to our Treasurer, his predecessors, the Ladies, Members and those Parents and Supporters who do such great work in raising funds, supporting the Club on Sunday nights, and in making cash gifts, and we very much appreciate what they have done.

A dark cloud in our finance sky, however, is the matter of Subs payments by players. The Executive proposes to the A.G.M. subs as low as possible (and, to date, below those of most Clubs, it seems), yet the greatest difficulties are experienced in getting them paid. Players subs collected annually, in total barely cover the cost of jersey purchases and maintenance, and it will be a big help to the coaches and the Executive alike if this matter can be improved substantially; strictly speaking, subs become due and payable on the date of the A.G.M.

STATISTICS

From the Registrar:

In the last ten years Jeeps have gone from strength to strength. Gone are the days when it was the unenviable task of the Third Grade Coach to telephone players or even non-players for days before a game in order that he had a side to take the field. Numbers were short, interest was low and the standards of the teams were, to say the least, unpredictable.

Third grade roll up on a Sunday was often amusing. Players met others who they had never seen before and quite often never saw again, as they drifted into the old Normanby ground, tired and bleery-eyed, but anxious to make up the numbers. It must be remembered that in those days to play at 12.30 was considered early and often an imposition on the leisure time of somewhat less dedicated players than we have about us today. It is doubtful that many considered the possibility of what we saw this year — namely, the Fifth Grade assembling at 9.30 for a 10 a.m. kick-off. The fragile condition of the players remains the same but the point I would like to make is that very little telephoning needed to be done. Coach Dick Farquhar arrived at Ballymore to find more than adequate numbers ready and waiting for their week-end exercise.

Many of the fifth graders were regular trainers and they helped boost the numbers at Finsbury on Tuesday and Thursday nights to record levels which are a far cry from the days when it was an exceptional night when over twenty players trained.

This resurgence of interest has provided us with excellent results in the last few years.

U19's and U18's have been finalists and in the open grades we provided four Grand Finalists in 1974 and three in 1975, including a well earned but previously elusive second grade premiership.

During the year, excluding fifth grade, 104 players took the field in the open sides, scoring between them 409 tries, surely an indication of the open game Jeeps are renowned for playing. Unfortunately, of these only 184 were converted — less than half, and had more been slotted, perhaps the figure of 73 wins in all grades would have been bettered. Only 12 games were lost during the year and 4 were drawn — figures which exhibit the overall consistency that the Club sides showed.

Another feature of the 1975 season is that a greater number of players are continuing to play on into their late 20's and early 30's. In the previous history of the Club it has been conceded that only three players had managed to play more than 200 games, which means a playing span of at least ten years. These were David Clark, Ivor Colquhoun and Dick Roberts. This season saw Eddie Kann make it, with Ross Mortimer and Buff Thomson certainties in 1976, whilst Jack Evans, David Park, Dugald Clark and Lloyd Graham could do it in 1977 or 1978.

It is good to see players staying on in the game, using their knowledge and experience for the benefit of the younger members of the Club. What it must mean for some of the newer members to have a season in either our third or fourth grade teams of the last few years. If, like in some overseas countries, an "Over 30" competition was introduced, we could draw from

our current playing members a side which would acquit itself extremely well. (See November Gazette).

As far as individual points scorers are concerned, it can be seen that this year four players achieved over 100 points for the season, with Peter Garbutt (33) and Louis Mackay-Payne (25) managing the feat with tries only. Dugald Clark and Peter Stanton did so with superior kicking as well. The feats of Garbutt and Mackay-Payne are remarkable when it is noted that in 1964 Barrie Munro won the highest try scoring club award with 9. This year no fewer than ten players scored over 10 tries.

It is not possible to mention all the noteable achievements of the 1975 season or, for that matter, of preceding years. We do have records which date from 1964 but information prior to this period is rather sketchy. If there are members or former members who have records, photographs, programmes or even memories, who would be interested in providing them to the Club in order that we can compile a detailed history, then we would certainly welcome to hear from them.





FIRST GRADE REPORT - D. CLARKE

The 1975 season for 1st Grade at first glance looked to be disappointing, if one thinks in terms of Grand Final success. After all, this is the end result every team strives to achieve, the culmination of a season's dedication and hard work. Probably, unfairly, it is the standard by which most teams are judged — on that one performance alone.

But let us cast our minds back through the season and try to evaluate what we did achieve.

Firstly, I would like to express my appreciation to all players who played under my coaching, for their unbending dedication to the job at hand — for their friendship and help during 1975, and for their ability to absorb and accept the criticism levelled at them by me, but, more importantly, to come back fighting and prove me wrong and not to pack it in. To the Professor for his enormous help in preparing my players' minds to the level that injuries were mostly forgotten, and to Bill Alvers for his expert knowledge on how to condition a team to such an extent that he literally had them eating out of his hands (or was it stripping?).

Sure, we didn't win the Grand Final - but I think our record showed that we were worthy of our position.

Of the 22 games, we lost the first 46–16, 16th 15–14 and the 22nd 20–6. The other 19 games we won. Some we won very well, playing magic football – some we just won, playing bad football, but still won. This shows to me, we at all times had the measure of our opponents, and the ability to control the pattern of play. We won the Horsley Cup, beating Brothers 15–4, just lost the Welsby Cup 15–14, and had the honour of being the first team to the Grand Final, beating Brothers 37–15.

We played a style of Rugby that was most entertaining and enjoyable for both player and spectator and, although it was so, I feel 10 man Rugby or 8 man Rugby must be given first consideration as it is at this point the game is won or lost.

It has been said that Rugby is an amateur sport and played for the enjoyment of all. Above all, the game is the thing. As a coach, I find it very hard to swallow that "crap". To me, winning isn't everything — it's the ONLY thing, and I would now like to record a few observations for training and playing standards.

Obviously, the amateur approach is dead. Owen Edwards said to me 14 years ago, "Just because we are amateur, doesn't mean we cannot approach the game with a professional mind." We continued that belief for years and still have the same feeling. Our approach is too amateurish.

Our season training should be intense. It's not good enough to run "cross countries" night after night with no incentive to improve. Players should have a greater responsibility towards preseason training and their attitudes will have to change, but I feel the Club should have a responsibility also. We should give incentive — Training programmes without reward are frightfully boring. We should look at the possibility of financing an annual trip to a RUGBY COUNTRY, for the first grade squad only, with better playing standards than out own. Obviously, New

Zealand — not the Far East or U.S.A. where pleasure is more important than the gaining of RUGBY KNOW-HOW. To me this is a waste of money and the pleasures required by most Rugby teams can be won all over the world.

A squad should be instructed under the control of the 1st Grade Coach and an experienced trainer with the idea of being exclusive and an honour to be selected, even at that early stage of the season. Standards of fitness should be set and can be set and recorded. The Rothmans Foundation has done this and is available.

The Club should provide an efficient scrum machine and weight training facilities available not only to 1st's but to the Club as a whole.

Players performances should be recorded properly with regard to progress and if not up to the standards set should be dropped forthwith, irrespective of position or ability, to make way for a player who will perform to the coach's standards. Records should be kept religiously by officials so that the feeling of importance permeates through the players.

Training times should be staggered more dramatically. It is nearly impossible to run a football team with aspiration to win a Grand Final on 1/4 of a football field. I feel the 1st Grade should be training at 7.30 so as to give emphasis to the fact that they are the top team and so get top conditions. These observations are designed to give the status required to get the top players in top condition into the top team and that the status gained, that of a 1st Grade G.P.S. player, is earned and honoured by the Club members.

I feel the Club should, next season, approach the Rothmans Foundation to use our facilities and 1st Grade players as demonstration at a coaching seminar organised by our Club,, whether at schools or at senior level, so as to avail to us the best coaching experts in the country.

Finally, let me say to all players who aspire to 1st grade, and even higher, that all the help in the world will not make it for you. Self motivation, dedication and superb fitness will – if you have the football ability.
