Gentlemen,

Your Executive has much pleasure in reporting upon those activities and highlights of the Club during the season recently concluded.

COMPETITION RESULTS.

The 1977 Season for our Glub, in sharp contrast to the results of the previous year when we won almost all of the Competition Cups and Trophies short of Grand Finals, was one of the leanest, if not the leanest, in the Club's long history, with teams and their players veering from brilliantly cohesive and gritty exhibitions to what can be kindly described at best as appalling, disinterested, 'don't care', with the justifiable exceptions of 4th Grade, who were most unlucky to be 'knocked out' in their second Semi after a season's general performance which others might well have emulated as to a regular standard of effort and the Under 18's who stuck to the job manfully despite regular losses and finished the season improving strongly. Certainly, winning Cups etc. is not the sole aim of the Club and certainly Rugby means a lot more too, and players appeared mostly to enjoy playing, but rather more team effort and spirit and much less individuality, and a much greater regard also for the Club's reputation standing and future would have made a lot of people a lot happier, not the least of these being our regular Superstars and the playing public at large.

In short, with notable exceptions, the standard of play and mental attitude to the game and the Club itself fell significantly below our norm, and it was not the fault of the Coaches, Trainer or the Selectors either. One can express the hope very strongly that "it was just one of those years:, and not likely to be a continuing situation.

CLUB HOUSE

The unanimous authorisation of Club Members to the Committee to proceed re Ashgrove was implemented with expedition and we commenced training there in early Feb. and it will be agreed by all that the Club is happily settled into its fine new Headquarters, assisted by our most co-operative partners Valley District Cricket Club, and looking forward to the gradual development of a multi-sporting complex

without equal in the State, and enjoying the undoubted advantages of very sports-minded and well-disposed neighbouring suburbs and schools. Naturally, this future development will only take place as priorities and finance permit, but we must always keep our sights high in this on-going operation. We had some very well attended house games, not the least being one Under 18 match (when a quite substantial sum was made on the sale of food and refreshments) and our new home was much admired by many, it is certainly a large and beautiful setting. The official opening in mid-year was one of the best and happiest of Club functions within memory, and the Arts and Crafts Day, a tremendous success, and described by some visitors from other Clubs as the biggest and best Rugby Home Game cum Club Function yet staged in Queensland. It is the aim to make it a regular item on the season's calendar. Another very happy event was our recent Club Annual Dinner and Presentation of Trophies, our first ever in our own home in over 92 years history.

FIRST GRADE

The result for 1977 was no doubt disappointing for a number of club supporters as the 1st Grade had contested the previous five Grand Finals.

Perhaps now that the "spell" of our club automatically making the Grand Final has been broken we may get some benefit from it. There has, for some time, been an air of acceptance that Jeeps has "a place of right" in a grand final. Which air of acceptance obviously does not exist in clubs such as Wests and Teachers. Those clubs, in successive years, have won the grand final after not having made the final five in the previous year. Though it is interesting to note that Teachers, strengthened by the inclusion of two Wallabies, fell back to fifth spot this year. Although supporters become disappointed in what they term as unsatisfactory achievements of the team they support one must also spare a thought for the players in that situation. The pressure on the players in losing the previtwo grand finals to Brothers and Teachers was enormous, and there is a tremendous personal let down for them as a resul of such a loss. Consequently it becomes a little harder ea new season to start fresh and full of determination to get the right to contest and hopefully win another grand final. In that situation there appears to be an element of "everything to lose and nothing to gain". Although the players

were again disappointed this year in not making the grand final and of course winning the premiership, they perhaps have not been as flattened by this loss, because there is not as much pressure in losing a preliminary final as in losing a grand final, as by the previous losses and in my opinion this will result in improved performances by the A Grade next year.

The loss of Peter Sinden who is going overseas to further his studies and also Mac Lamond who has indicated that business commitments will prevent him from completing another full A Grade season will be felt in the forwards. Fortunately and, perhaps a little unusually, Jeeps have in the under 18s this year two very promising props in Chris Todd and Michael Burrows both of whom are destined for A Grade at an early date. In the second row as well as having David Hillhouse, Graham Brand (awarded "The Best Forward for 1977") and Robin Thomson we have players such as Fred Willis, a vigorous and underrated forward, and John Lynch from the 1976 juniors both of whom have enormous potential; and so perhaps the loss of Peter Sinden and Mac Lamond will not be felt as severely as it was originally thought.

Throughout the season we had a number of outstanding performances both individually and by the team. The season again got off to an excellent start when we beat the premiers 34-0. Unfortunately the draw did not favour us after that, the second game was against Wests on Easter Monday and the records should reveal that G.P.S. have never won an Easter competition fixture in recent history and 1977 was no exception. In fact the defeat at the hands of Wests was the first of four out of five games we were to suffer at their hands which can only be a tribute to the premiers. We then went into the unfortunate situation of having two byes in three weeks with a game against Q.I.T. sandwiched inbetween the byes, and the game against Souths at the end of that month produced the teams second loss out of four games, and without making excuses, no dou. the poor build up at the start of the season attributed to the loss. Although we had fine three-quarters all year, and enormous depth in that regard, people who followed the team closely would be aware of how we were plagued with injuries in that part of the team. Ross Davies was an acquisition to the club. However he tore his hamstring and came down with glandular fever in the

first month, Dugald Clark played more games in this season than he had previously and again was an enormous asset to the club. In fact he only missed a couple of games and well deserved his award as the club's best back. In the centre: Greg Shambrook unfortunately borke a bone in his thumb in the early game against Souths (the break was not assisted) three or four supporters diagnosing it as a dislocation and trying to pull it back into place) and Shammy also had p roblems with corked thighs throughout the season and he played fewer games A Grade this year than he had in his previous seasons with the club. David Rathie made a welcome return to football but also had some injury problems especially towards the end of the season which prevented him fro playing for the club consistently. Rob Hayes who won the best Colt award and is the most exciting prospect in the cl although he played quite a number of games, he too suffered firstly a corked thigh and then a bad shoulder injury towar the end of the season which kept him sidelined for about tr weeks. Rob's keenness to play for the club was well exemp! ied by the occasionwhen he was selected as a reserve with the Queensland Under 23 side to play on a Sunday. The 1st Grade was also playing that day and Rob was disallowed by t Q.R.U. for playing with the 1st Grade. He therefore turned up at Ashgrove on the Saturday afternoon with his boots and volunteered to play and in fact did play for the 2nd Grade. On another occasion when we were playing against Wests at Toowong without reserves as the 2nd Grade were playing at t same time at Redcliffe, Rob Hayes was injured in the first minutes of the game and perhaps should have left the field, however, he elected to play on for the good of the team and doing so he aggravated the injury to such an extent that wh the Queensland team which played the following day had a la withdrawal he, as first back reserve, was overlooked.

Don Regeling, after making the most promising start to any football season, and playing magnificient football up until the Queensland Under 23 game in May, suffered a number of injuries with a result that Don anly played nine A Grade gar for the Club this season. He, like David Rathie and Greg Shambrook appear to have been treated cruelly by the State selectors. After participating admirably in the major game: throughout the year they were discalded from the overseas treated all three of them have the ability and guts to show the State selectors they were wrong. Andrew was awarded the trophy for the most improved player and there is no doubt in my mind that he will Javelop into one of the finest fullbacks out club has produced, and that puts him in the category of David Clark and Lloyd Graham, and also one of the finest fullbacks in this State. He has all the natural attributes for a fullback and also the dedication to develop those attributes fully.

I would like to thank Dugald Clark and Chris Carberry the team's captain and vice-captain for their assistance throughout the season. Chris played every game but one and missed that for personal reasons, not through injury, his contribution to the team was very significant. He also made contributions to other teams including the juniors and no doubt will be prepared to do so in the future. He is the most knowledgeable scrummager in Australia and perhaps in 1978 all teams will be less reticent about asking for his assistance.

Fater Sinden, Roy Nerichow and Feter Devenport (awarded "The Best and Fairest" Player for 1977) call for special mention being three players who played every game for the club this season which is an excellent effort. Players such as David Burrows, David Blackford, Mark Oberhart and Pater Bissett who played for the team regularly and also, after playing their 2nd Grade games, were prepared to sit on the bench as reserves weekend after weekend deserve special mention.

To the selectors and committee also for their support throughout the season I thank them and wish the team the best of luck for 1978.

TREASURER'S REPORT

R.A. Anderson

I present for your consideration and adoption the Club's audited Balance Sheet and Income & Expenditure Statement for the year ended 31st October, 1977.

The Club transferred from Finsbury Park to the Ashgrove Ground during the year and entered into a joint venture with Valley District Cricket Club to provide clubhouse and associated facilities for the two sporting clubs. This move resulted in the sale of the Finsbury Park club house and ground lights and the following major commitments and expenditures:-

Purchase of 50% of Ashgrove clubhouse \$
and associated facilities 46,500
Field Lights - Ashgrove 10,538

While part of these cash commitments have been paid, \$37,200 remains outstanding on which interest must be paid.

The greatly improved facilities at Ashgrove are a major improvement for club members. However, the increased costs of these facilities together with generally higher charges has again resulted in major increases in many costs during the year. This expenditure further stretched the Clubs resources.

The collection of members subscriptions as usual was very difficult. Five members have subscribed for Ashgrove Ground Membership. The Committee requests that urgent support be given by all members in all categories. Subscriptions are intended for the running of the club and this will require even greater expenditure during 1978 year.

The Finance Sub-Committee of the Management Committee continued to operate for the purposes of organising and conducting fund raising activities to assist the Club in meeting its commitments to Valley District Cricket Club. This Committee and the Club urgently needs further strong support of members, past and present, and supporters to raise the funds to meet the liability of \$37,200 and for other expenditure now being planned.

Q.I.U. REPORT

The Queensland Rugby season has been a sucessful one again this year. The Club competition probably produced one of its best ever seasons, with the evenness and standard improving immeasurably. The Queensland side maintained its winning record and remains unbeaten at Ballymore in the last two seasons.

However, rather than talk about the year that has passed it may well be best to look to what is in the future.

As most Jeeps supporters will be aware, the Queensland team is undertaking its most ambitious tour to date in the early new year. The trip is of approximately 3 weeks duration and covers Japan, Canada and the United States. Although it is argued on some counts, that the money could be better spent, I doubt that is so. Certainly, the standard of football which the Queensland side will experience, especially the The United States and Canada will be surprisingly high. One only has to recall the American Eagles first international against England, (where they went down, admittedly 37 to 11) but scored two tries in the last 10 minutes. Reflecting on the New South Wales country tour of the States some few years ago and remembering that in that year Country beat all-comers and easily took out the Wallaby trophy - the tour by a Queensland team surely must enhance its prospects for continuing its winning record in 1978.

The Queensland representative scene is extremely crowded next year with games against Otago,Nth.Auckland,Counties, Canterbury,Vic. New South Wales, Junior All Blacks & Wales. Bearing in mind the quality of the players that are going to be encountered in the opposition, it is more than apparent that Q'ld. Rugby followers are going to be really treated to a feast of some of the finest football to be seen in this State for many along year. It is appreciated that with such a hectic representative season, that there

may be some adverse effect upon the Brisbane Club competition. The representative matches of the last 2 years, which though not as heavy a programme as for 1978, have not in any way adversely effected the standard of the competition, & have I feel, significantly increased the standard of Rugby played as a result of the representative player experiences. For this reason I doubt that the clubs and the competiti will suffer unduly in the new year as a result of the representative itinerary.

Further, in July 1978, Aust is to tour New Zealand, & having regard the fact that the majority of the matches which are mentioned above a in the early part of the season, one would assume that if the Queensl team performs to its ability, that we should see a more than usual representation of Queenslanders in the Australian Side

With regard to the Club Competition for the new year, there have been number of rather significant changes. Firstly, 2 Clubs, Ipswich & Redcliffe - have been promoted into A-Grade. The arguments for & against this move are many & varied, & I do not propose to enter into any gre. dialogue in that respect. Should anybody care to discuss the reason th Q.R.U. has taken this step, I would be more than pleased to confer on the same. To the point, the decision has been made. The 2 Clubs in que ion have assured us that they will be able to provide four full teams which shall, of course, remedy the many defects which the uneven draws of the passed few years have provided. I am sure from that point of vi along, that G.P.S. Club supporters will applaude the decision which ha been made. With a 10 team competition, there will be 2 rounds of 9 gam with 4 byes. The 4 byes are fairly evenly distributed throughout the season, with an emphasis towards the earlier part thereof. On the firs 3 byes, a secondary competition involving only 1st & 2nd Grades is envisaged. To be included in this competition, shall be combined sides from the Darling Downs, Gold Coast & Rockhampton Sub-Unions I do not think that Jeeps will travel far afield in this initial year of this competition, as I think all of their games are either in Bne. or on th Gold Coast. This competition is aimed at providing country players wit experience against our allegedly higher standard city players. It is hoped that in the way, the standard of Rugby throughout the State will improve. To ensure that the competition is a success, Clubs are direct that their best sides are put on to the field and that players & coache regard the games in a serious vein. It is remembered that the State selectors shall view all of the games.

The points for the competition will be on a similar basis to the Bne. Grade competition, and in the event of drawn points, then on a points for-and-against basis. The exact dates for the competition fixtures has not, as yet, been finalised but it is likely that they shall in in the

months of April, May and June, The grand final of the competition will be played on Exhibition Wednesday.

The other remaining bye shall be on the Queens's Birthday weekend, which shall supply the Clubs with a long weekend for mid=season tours which they have been demanding over the last passed few years.

Whilst the First & Second Grade teams are engaged in the Cup competition mentioned above, no alternative competition shall be arranged for Third & Fourth Grades. It is up to the individual Clubs to arrange for 'friendlies' to be played for these teams, if they so desire.

It is hoped that by the time that this Report has been printed, that a Old. Director of Coaching or Development Officer will have been appointed. The appointee will be employed on a full-time basis, with a particular emphasis on development of Rugby Union growth throughout the State & on coaching on all levels. A number of nominations have been forthcoming, of which the majority of a very high calibre, & should ensure that the appointee- and the project as a whole - is a success. The project has been made possible as a result of the monies forthcoming from the Soccer Pools Organisation.

Thereare other administrative changes which shall take place within the Q.R.U. next year. The competition rules have recently been revamped and should come into force in January of the new year. Further, the competition will be administrated by a Sub-Committee of the Union to a large degree. That Sub-Committee is constituted by delegates from each of the Brisbane Clubs as well as the Qld. Referees" Association. Along with other changes, it is hoped that shortly after January of the new year also, that the Council of the Union shall see fit to incorporate, and such incorporation shall also involve cartain constitutional changes which, to a degree, are somewhat drastic & also long overdue. Further in the wind, & possibly in the future, is the possibility of a Tennis & Squash Court complex with the ancillary pleasures of a Swimming Pool & Gymnasium. At this stage, this project is certainly embryonic, but it certainly has a number of tantalising and profitable prospects about it. The area on the eastern side of the ground is to be developed into playing fields All in all, 1978 promises far more than 1977 for the Qld.Rugby Union & that season was an exciting & most rewarding one for all supporters of Rugby Union in Queensland.
