"A" GRADE

Gentlemen.

1979 was the year of mixed fortunes. The highlights of the season could be summarised as follows:

- 1. The Welsby Cup final.
- 2. The XXXX Cup final.
- 3. Finishing fourth in the minor premiership.
- 4. Playing in the elimination semi-final.

Our achievements in those three major games were not great. We were let down in the really important games by mediocre performances by several players. A lack of professional approach to the game was evident when we played in major contests.

The essential element in a major football match is an intense mental preparation in conjunction with the normal physical approach that one has to any game. It is not good enough for individuals to let the team down by

their off the field performances the night before a game,

When any Club accepts a loss as being good enough, then the club itself is not good enough. It is now left to the younger players who really wish to achieve the coveted aim of a First Grade Premiership, to work very hard in the off season and the early part of next season and maintain a high level of performance.

There are several players in the club who have the necessary attributes of top footballers, but their approach has to be tailored to meet the very heavy pressures of major football. We have a number of experienced players in the side, but unless those experienced players can really perform in major games, then the younger players will not develop as they should.

In summary, the football season of 1979 was a disappointing one. To me our performance in the last game against Souths left me speechless. There was nothing that could be said about the performance in terms of determination, approach, desire to win, etc. We just did not want to win badly enough. The season had been a long one, and most players appeared to accept defeat as a conclusion to the season.

The First Grade team was probably better prepared for that semi final game than any other side that I have been associated with in Rugby Union. Unfortunately, a number of individuals let the team down at various times in the pre-match preparation, treating their own self-interest before the

interest of team members.

As First Grade coach, I am indebted to the support I received throughout the year from Peter Phillips, whose talents and knowledge are a great asset to any club, and when young players realise the knowledge they can gain from his experience, they will develop into much better players.

To Chris Carbury, who gave many hours of unselfish support to the First Grade side, I thank him very much for his efforts, and I believe there is no person better equipped in Queensland to extol the virtues of the scrum

and line-out as Chris Carbury does.

Finally, to all the players who played First Grade throughout the season, I thank them for their efforts, but I qualify the statement by saying, that it requires a 100% effort in every game throughout the season, not just in the games that they feel like playing.

I wish the Club every success in the 1980 season.

TREASURERS REPORT

R.B. Farquhar

I present for your consideration and adoption the Club's audited Balance Sheet and Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended October 31, 1979.

The report shows a surplus for the year, after extraordinary items, of

\$2,483.

Further ground improvements were provided during the year in the

clubs continuing effort to provide, with limited resources, the best possible facilities for club members. In particular, \$500 was spent on purchasing field lights from the Normanby League Club and a further \$2,188 by the Joint Committee on levelling and top-dressing the playing fields. The Balance Sheet at October 31, 1979 of the Joint Venture between the two

clubs is attached to this report.

During the year the Committee has re-negotiated the terms of repayment of the loan payable to the Valley District Cricket Club. Under the original agreement the club was committed to \$9,300 per year and this proved to be beyond its capabilities. Valleys have now agreed to extend the period of the loan for a further ten years from October I, 1979. The effect of this is that annual repayments have been reduced to \$5,100, a sum which the Committee believes is well within our financial capabilities and should enable equal participation with Valleys in further ground and clubhouse improvements. The Committee is particularly grateful to Valleys for their assistance in this regard.

Twenty-nine subscriptions were received for Ashgrove Ground Memberships, making a total of forty-three to date. The contributions of these members has greatly assisted the club in its move to Ashgrove but the Committee is disappointed that so few of our hundreds of members and supporters have been prepared to support the club in this way. Applications for membership are still being accepted and all members who have not yet subscribed are urged to give serious consideration to the benefits of

membership.

The collection of membership subscriptions was, as usual, very difficult and there was a sharp drop in revenue from both Senior and Junior subscriptions this year. Subscriptions are intended for the running to the club and the importance of co-operation from all members in paying cannot be over emphasised. Anexample of this is that in 1979, subscriptions amounted to less than 50% of the cost of Jerseys purchased and used during the season.

Our thanks to the Ladies Committee who, apart from providing excellent catering facilities during the season, earned a profit of \$912 and donated it

to the club.

The financial report shows that income from all fund raising sources was down in this year and the club urgently requests further strong support from all members and supporters to reverse this trend. All members and supporters are invited to contribute to fund raising activities in the form of assistance and/or ideas during the coming year.
