ANNUAL REPORT - 1981 SEASON

Gentlemen,

Your Executive has much pleasure in reporting upon those activities and highlights of the Club during the Season recently concluded.

Competition Results

The 1981 Season provided our Club with both great victories and dismal failure. Seldom during the season in any grade were we able to predict the results from week to week. Our player numbers in the open grades did not decrease however the turnout from week to week fluctuated to such an extent that coaches and selectors had a difficult time in forming any concrete teams. It may well be a better idea to drop a lower team out than to have the numerous doubling up of players in grades. We must all endeavour to not only increase our numbers numerically but to ensure that the players we have turn up on a regular basis. It augurs well for the club when we consider our under age players. It can be said with no contradiction that this years bunch of juniors have fitted into both the rugby and social sides of the club better than any of their predecessors. The individual teams reports are printed in this publication but a short comment on each is warranted.

The First Grade promised so much but did not rise to the heights we expected. The team is a blend of youth and experience and can improve greatly through total dedication. Special mention must be made of Tony Roberts' commitment to his team. He has shown just what the word commitment means. He will be missed around the club in 1982.

The Second Grade proved a great disappointment and I ask all members to read the report contained herein. 1982 will prove to be a much better year for this side than 1981.

Doug Stevenson - once again toiled throughout the season and we lost count of the number of players who turned out in this grade. It was interesting to note that during the season 33 people received points in the best and fairest competition for this grade. Numerous doubling up of players from fourth grade did nothing to help the performance of this team.

The Fourths recaptured their premiership and in doing so showed great determination and spirit. All players are to be congratulated on their efforts during the year both on and off the field.

The under 19 team with Graham Brand at the helm played great football throughout the season. It will be very interesting to see some of these players in the open grades in 1982.

Only superlatives can describe our Under 18 team. A magnificent season. They played their grand final a week early, however, the spirit displayed by this team if continued by them during the years to come with G.P.S. will lift our Club to great heights. David Newstead handled the team extremely well and it was a lesson to all in the way he combined the passing on of rugby talents and the making of an enjoyable social season for his players. With the influx of players into the club next year the Under 19 side will be striving for the elusive flag.

GPS IN NEW ZEALAND 1981

We left Brisbane Saturday, 28th March and arrived in Auckland about 1.00 p.m. We were met by Hugh Roberts with driver "Skeeter" and a bus from Auckland Returned Servicemen Association. We were then taken to Weymouth Rugby Club where we trained and then for the first time sampled the great N.Z. hospitality. Later that evening there was a social for all concerned.

Sunday 29th, we played Weymouth Rugby Club. The game was a good open running game where we ran the ball from all parts of the field. We scored 5 tries in winning the game 31 - 18. After the game a hangi was ready and another night of entertainment began.

The 30th many rose seederly and we left Weymouth for the Bay of Islands in the north. This trip was the start of many a game of "guts" in which many people get their finger burnt and Mick Arnold emerged quite prosperous. Once we arrived at the Bay of Islands we trained and had something to eat. We then travelled west to Hokiangi Harbour. We arrived at the Marae which is a Maori meeting house. There we were welcomed onto the Marae in traditional Maori style. Later that night we were hosted by the Oponini Rugby Club.

Tuesday 31st we rose to a call for early training run. After the run all had breakfast. About 11 o'clock a boat trip on Hokiangi Harbour was organised. We had lunch on the trip. We went about 28 sea miles up the harbour to Horeke where we intend to have a training run before a bar-b-que. We went to a primary school where we were to train. The children welcomed us onto their ground in Maori tradition and also sang us a few songs. We then trained on their oval and ran back for a bar-b-que and a few beers. After the bar-b-que we were all in high spirits for a boat trip back to where we caught the bus back to the Marae after several stops at different water holes.

While we were away that day a death had occurred in a family associate with the Marae; and they were coming to the Marae for the funeral. This was an interesting part about staying on the Marae, as we saw part of the Maori culture we could never had seen if we had stayed any where else.

April 1st we rose early for light training run, then breakfast. After breakfast we discussed the game. After about 11 a.m. we left by bus for the game. We played Hokiangi Union which is one sub-union of North Auckland. The game was played very tight up front. Once we got the ball to the backs and threw it to the support we were able to score tries. We scored 4 tries in this game to win 21 - nil. After the game a meal was prepared and it was enough to feed an army. That finished about 5 p.m. and we had to head back to Marae where we had tea and then we went to the hotel where they had arranged for an extended licence.

Thursday 2nd we rose early and went to the Marae where we had breakfast and left on our ten hour drive to Turangi. We went via Weymouth club where we trained and had a few beers with some of the members. We arrived at Turangi about 10 p.m. that night.

Friday 3rd we rose relatively late. About 11 all went for a run. And then in the afternoon we did what we liked.

Saturday 4th we played our final game against Hautu Prison Farm who weren't a very well organised team. We won that game 58 - nil. After the game another hangi was organised and we ate.

Sunday 5th, our final day we rose about 6.30 and left for Auckland where we caught the plane back to Brisbane.

FIRST GRADE NOTES

1981 was a season for me that showed more promise and potential than many other seasons, and unfortunately ended with an abruptness not really predicted by anybody.

Although there was certainly an absence of organised depth in the Club, this did not, in my opinion, affect the good attitude of the hard-core twentythree First Grade players available, and we were fortunate that we were never in the situation of taking the field without what could be described as a reasonably strong First Grade side. The better organisation and direction of the Club was evident and gave the players more confidence. Unfortunately, someone forgot to tell Teachers how confident and strong we were, and players became spectators sooner than anticipated.

The New Zealand trip at the beginning of the season, which is dealt with elsewhere in the report, was a great start to the season and built some camaraderieship amongst the eighteen players who toured that perhaps would have been difficult to achieve without it. I thoroughly recommend organisation of similar trips to New Zealand in future years.

It is perhaps easier to now make a comment on the players who played consistently for the team throughout the season, individually:-

1. Peter Lemmey.
Peter perhaps was lucky to get his spot in First Grade initially against Wests because of Ken Bolton's unavailability. Ken then became unavailable or injured each time he had a chance to challenge Peter, which was unfortunate for him. In the end, Peter developed tremendously. He has the rare ability to play on both sides of the scrum and will be a real asset in future.
2. Brad Fox.
Brad's first game as hooker was the first competition game against Wests. He never looked back and in fact had a run for the Queensland Fifteen in Nambour towards the end of the Season.
3. Roy Nerichow.
Roy played as good a football this year as he has ever played and seems to have the ability to go on and on. I have the feeling that we will be celebrating his passing Buff's record of games for the Club, if Buff ever stops playing.
4. Ross Farquhar.
Ross is a very talented footballer. Predominantly a back-rower. He got a chance in the second row and then, notwithstanding a very strong challenge from Steve Smith, retained his position.
5. Steve Smith.
Steve was very unlucky not to be in the side at the end of the season, which was the result of Ross Farquhar's form and the re-emergence of David Hillhouse. There is no doubting his skills and the fact

that he was travelling to and from the Coast during the middle of the season for training probably had some effect on his application to the game in the middle of the season. However, the games he did play in the First at the end of the season were very good. He has the potential to do better things.

6. David Hillhouse.
It was a great boost to have Hector back in the side and next year augurs well for the Club, assuming that he can arrange his flying commitments around his football.
7. Brett Armstrong.
I assume that anybody who is reading this would have seen him play, and really there is not much more to be said. As a nineteen year old, he is a very complete footballer. One can only assume that representative honours are not far away.
8. Murray Phillips.
Murray is the complete foil for Brett Armstrong and they both perform better when the other is on the field. Accordingly, I assume that when one achieves representative honours, the other will be there also.
9. Peter Roberts.
Apart from the catastrophe in the Semi-Final against Teachers, Robbo was always an inspiration to the team. In a physical game he is a very physical forward and one better on your side than on the others.
10. Mick Arnold.
Mick won the best and fairest clearly defeating Andrew Austin, Brett Armstrong and Dugald Clark, and there is little more that can be added to that performance. If he had been given Tony Parker's opportunities, in my opinion he would have made a better fist of them.
11. Dugald Clark.
Notwithstanding the promise of Brett Green, Dugald is a hard act to follow. I suppose I have said the same things about him in each of the four years I have had the privilege of being associated with him in G.P.S. First Grade. He is a complete footballer, his skills and attitude leave nothing to be desired.
12. Brett Green.
At the beginning of the season, I mentioned to Brett that I hoped he would have half a dozen or so games in A Grade, which he was fortunate to have. Of all the positions, 5/8 is the most difficult in A Grade for a nineteen year old to make his debut. Brett has all the skills required to follow Dugald and I am sure we are going to see some exciting football from him next year.
13. Bruce Huxley.
Bruce developed tremendously and I feel that a lot of his development came from the New Zealand tour. He was a well-thought of schoolboy footballer, but had not produced a lot at Club level. However, things changed this year and hopefully he will be a fixture next year.
14. Bill Fletcher.
Bill, because of study commitments, could only play the first round. However, those commitments should be finished in time for him to play a full season next year, where his presence will be appreciated.
15. Brett Gosper.
Brett's broken scafoïd bone was probably one of the hard luck stories of the season. He showed his skills towards the end of the season. However, in my opinion, when he comes back for a full season next year, the Club will see how fortunate it is to have a player of his calibre in the team.

16. Malcolm Scott.
Malcolm seems to be the complete three-quarter. He has fantastic understanding of the game, a lot of natural ability, an inclination to be lazy but also a player who should follow Brett Armstrong and Murray Phillips into the big time.
17. Peter Garbutt.
Unfortunately, Garbo only played a handful of games and was never fully fit, and has been lost to Cairns, hopefully not for ever.
18. Ian McLean.
There is no doubt of Snapper's ability. His accident against Brothers in the first round, with a depressed fracture of the cheek bone, was perhaps the greatest loss during the season. His ability to come back was a true test of character and, again, he is going to be a player for G.P.S. in the future who will keep on scoring tries and doing great things.
19. Max Williams.
Max returned to the Club late in the season and did not have a full chance to settle down, but hopefully we will see him for the full season, not only on the weekends, but on Tuesdays and Thursdays, next year.
20. Andrew Austin.
Andrew was the Team Captain this year, which is a heavy responsibility. His fine form was appropriately rewarded by selection in the Queensland team, which was certainly overdue. This time last year I said that if it wasn't for Roger Gould, Andrew Austin would have played for Australia, and perhaps all is not lost yet.
21. Blair Barnhill.
I have left Blair until last for a special mention. Blair was one of the stars of the team last year and found it difficult to have a permanent spot this year, mainly because of the talents of Brett Armstrong and Murray Phillips. When he did play, he never let the side down. These are problems which the Coach likes to have on one hand, but doesn't really like to have on the other. Blair's full commitment to 2nd Grade, when he was left in that side, was a tribute to his character.

For all others who have assisted during the season, including Geoff Robinson, David Park, Bruce Hatcher, Lloyd Graham, Ross Duus, Tom Budgen, Cam Osborne, I extend my thanks and wish the incoming First Grade Coach good luck for next season.

SECOND GRADE REPORT 1981

The 1981 season which for the Reserve Grade looked so promising at the beginning of the year turned into a dismal flop.

GPS Reserve Grades for many years have been leading contenders in their competition and have always provided the strength which A Grade has needed during the season. This year Reserve Grade was once again called on to assist First Grade.

Brett Green, Simon Winchester, Blair Barnhill and Buff Thomson to name but a few were chopping and changing each week. This, combined with injuries to Reserve Grade players, meant that the same team did not run on 2 weeks in a row and replacements had often to be scrounged from third grade after they had played for that grade.

As the season progressed players who were capable of better games lost a good deal of their enthusiasm and interest. Whilst some criticism can be levelled at the players themselves, to be fair any comments as regards the spirit of Reserve Grade or rather lack of it, can be attributed to some degree to a lack of firmness and direction from Club Officials. Reserve Grade players were somewhat non plused from time to time to see a specialist in one position changed from that position for either promotion to a different position or simply lateral movement to a different position. This not only does not help the player, unless he is of exceptional ability, but also mitigates against stability of the team nucleus. Perhaps if this is to be done in the future the persons responsible would in the interests of the players and teams, no matter what grade, explain the reasons for such decisions. In this way perhaps the spirit of the players would not be so adversely effected.

It is obvious that any Club is only as strong as its lower grades and whilst the A Grade premiership is everybody's object, 1982 it is hoped will see a sterner approach to selection and some long overdue attention to second and third grade.

THIRD GRADE NOTES

As most Club Members would know, 1981 was not one of the better years for the Thirds. There are probably many reasons for this fact and most of them would be indirect in nature, but there can be no doubt that the lack of player numbers was the most significant problem. The Third Grade Team did not have any identity and was not really a "team", but a collection of (usually, but not always) 15 players who wore the Club colours from about 12.15 to 1.45.

Promotions to the Seconds and injuries took their normal toll but our real problem lay in our inability to "encourage" players to turn out every week. There were a large number of Third Grade players who made themselves available only occasionally and only rarely was anyone advised of their situation. We consequently had trouble selecting teams and even more trouble in putting 15 players on the field. In this regard, the Thirds owe a great debt of thanks to the Fourth Grade players who doubled up on many occasions to ensure that we had a full side, although there were times when their (understandable) reluctance to do so caused me to lose my sense of humour.

Firstly, I would like to thank those players who did train and play regularly and those who did contact us if they were unavailable, for it is those players who make it worthwhile playing Rugby. The more of those sorts of players we have in the Club, the more worthwhile it is for every player and supporter and the more enjoyment everyone will get from being associated with G.P.S. Also, congratulations are extended to the team's award winners, Graham Lavin (Best and Fairist), Mike Higgins (Best Forward) and Rewi Wairau (Best Back).

TREASURER'S REPORT

I present for your consideration and adoption, the Club's Audited Balance Sheets and Statements of Income and Expenditure for the year ended 31 October 1981.

The financial accounts disclose the following surpluses (deficiencies) for the last three years.

The Club has experienced its most successful financial trading year ever.

This success is the result of many hours of hard work by the Ladies Committee (profit \$1,128 from catering), Lyne Jones and Mike O'Pray (profit \$3,300 from bar trading), Ian Whittle and his captains (\$2,386 from hotel raffles), Lloyd Graham and his helpers (\$3,570 from doubles and the trifecta) and every club member who sold tickets, supported club functions and paid for their purchases from the Club.

However, improvements can be made. The following areas need either increased support by club members or further controls by the new Committee, if 1982 is to be a financially successful year for the Club.

- (a) Functions (Profit \$735. 1980 profit \$3,017.)
Two functions during the year produced losses - the Black Tie Dinner (Loss \$145; 1980 profit \$2,100) and the Annual Trophy Night Dinner (Loss \$348, not including the cost of trophies and other presentations).
- (b) Clothing (Profit \$21, 1980 loss \$991)
A higher profit could be expected in this area. Sales for the year totalled \$2,156 and a suggested reason for a greater profit not being recorded is that some members forgot to pay for their club purchases.

In this financial year, the Club has met its financial commitments to the Valley District Cricket Club, with payments of \$2,097 capital and \$3,046 of interest being made in respect of the outstanding loan. These cheques have not been deposited by the Valley District Cricket Club, although they have been taken to account in determining the cash at bank figure in the Club's Balance Sheet.

The Club contributed \$2,750 (1980 \$2,710) to the running of the jointly owned buildings and grounds improvements through the Valleys/G.P.S. Joint Committee. The details of that Committee's results for the year are set out in the Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Statement attached to this Report.

In conclusion, I invite all members to assist in any way possible to making 1982 a more rewarding and financially successful year for G.P.S.; your Club.

In prior years, consolidation has been made and this has tended to give an incorrect impression of the Club's finances. The 1979 and 1980 comparative figures have been adjusted accordingly.

TREASURER'S REPORT

R.B. FARQUHAR

I present for your consideration and adoption the club's audited Balance Sheet and Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended October 31, 1980.

The report shows a loss for the year amounting to \$3,234 compared to a surplus of \$2,483 in 1979.

Total Income dropped from \$20,244 in 1979 to \$11,044 this year. This disappointing result is brought about by a severe reduction in income from the club's regular fundraising activities, primarily due to lack of support for the few members prepared to give their time to these activities.

In particular, I make the following comments:

- (a) Bar
Fewer home games were held during the year and it can therefore, be expected that turnover would be reduced. However, this does not explain the reduction in profit to \$1,250 on 11% of turnover. It will be necessary for the incoming committee to introduce much tighter controls if the bar is to continue as an important revenue earner for the club.
- (b) Hotel Raffles
Revenue from raffles at the Embassy, National and Hamilton was down at all hotels.
- (c) Functions
The Black tie dinner contributed \$2,100 of this \$2,397 and our thanks go to the organizing committee for their fine efforts.
- (d) Clothing and Equipment
This loss arose from giving away T Shirts to school boys and providing free socks and shorts to junior players. I feel that more discretion should be used before clothing is given away in future years.
- (e) Subscriptions
Senior Subscriptions were increased from \$16 to \$20 and Juniors from \$8 to \$10 for the 1980 season. Senior membership increased from 66 in 1979 to 84 this year. Four Ashgrove Ground Memberships were also sold.
- (f) Other Income
Significant features here are a drop in income from doubles from \$3,347 in 1979 to \$2,191 this year, again through lack of support. Included under raffles is \$1,819 from the car raffle and our thanks go to Les Dodwell for his efforts in organizing this.

The Club's contribution to the running of the club-house by Valleys/GPS joint committee amounted to \$2,710 and details of the committee's results for the year are set out in the Balance Sheet and Income Statement attached to this report. Our commitments to the Valley District Cricket Club have been met during the year.

The GPS Junior's results which are consolidated in the club report, showed a surplus of \$18 for the year as shown in the attached Income Statement.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the few members who contributed to fundraising activities during the year and urge all members to offer their support in this area in order that the club may meet its running expenses and commitment to Valleys in 1981.
