PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

1986 was a successful year for Jeeps. Following last year's Annual General Meeting, the incoming Committee set itself some optimistic objectives. Some of these objectives were achieved and some were not, but in all cases, great progress was made. The overall Club objective was to enjoy the game of running Rugby from the players, coaches, administrators and supporters point of view. When you consider the number of tries that our First Grade scored, more than any other Club, and the style of game we played, this objective was certainly achieved. Our more specific objectives were:

To win the First Grade Premiership. This one we did not achieve, but finished second on the Premiership ladder, and were beaten in the Preliminary Final. Considering the high standard played throughout the competition, in my opinion, this was one of our most successful years that I have witnessed in my time with the Club. Full credit must go to Chris Carberry and John Brass for their coaching expertise, and to David Codey for his contribution on the paddock, firstly as a player and secondly, as the team skipper. 1987 is the year that we will win the "Big One".

Our second objective was to finish in the Top Three in the Club Championship, the Club Championship being based on First to Fourth Grade and Colts One performances. We finished fourth, five points short of our objective. All of the open teams, except our Second Grade and Colts One and Two, played in the Finals, so that the overall strength of the Club has improved, but Premierships are what it's about.

Our third objective was to assist with the development and further strengthening of the Ashgrove G.P.S. segment of our Club — "the little fellas". This objective was well and truly achieved, and I am proud to say that the growth and reputation of this group is second to none in Queensland, and in the years not too far ahead, will start to make a real impact on our senior competition performance.

Objective Number Four was to finish the year with a credit balance of \$20,000. As you will see in our Treasurer's Report, we finished with \$7,899. Last season was the most successful year in our history. This year's performance shows our total turn-over was \$49,996 in comparison to last year's \$41,101. Running a Rugby Club in 1986 requires a professional approach, with sponsorship becoming a very necessary ingredient to Club funding. We are appreciative of contributions made by Nundah Mitsubishi, The Normanby Hotel, PGH Clay Bricks & Pavers, L. J. Hooker, Penfolds Wines, and three Club stalwarts who came forward at the end of the season to assist our



quest for a Premiership — Dudley Dick, Jim Mee and Ian Cameron.

Our last objective was to finalize decisions as to our home at Ashgrove, and to set in train a programme so that decisions could be made whether to proceed with the development of a new ground. Recommendations have been put to you regarding these matters, and hopefully, this Club will decide tonight its future in these two important areas.

We congratulate the many players from junior ranks right through to the Big Boys, who were selected in Brisbane, Queensland and Australian Under 21 Teams. In particular, we congratulate David Codey, on representing Australia in two Tests, in winning the Rothmans Gold Medal and winning the John Harris Memorial Trophy. The dark horse in the Rothmans Medal was Boyd Curran, who finished second in total points to David Codey, and through an administrative error, either at Rothmans or the Q.R.U., was not invited to the Dinner. Anthony Herbert also pulled well, finishing sixth: Our congratulations to you both on fine seasons.

For the first time, the Club had a paid full-time employee, responsible for much of the work involved with catering, as well as ground maintenance. This is one of the major reasons why our funds are in such good shape. Our thanks go to Dwight Jones, Greg Lucre and Barry Darwin in particular, and to the many others who assisted. Obviously, the Ladies Committee was very much a part of this success, and to the Mums, girlfriends, wives — thank-you.

The coaches will make comments further in this booklet, however it would be remiss of me not to give a special thanks to Anna and Jackie, the Club strappers.

Jeeps is truly a non-denominational Club in every respect; the Fijian connection contributed to the Club in many ways. In A Grade, their total try contribution for the season was outstanding.

As our success grew throughout the season, it was great to see some of the old boys returning to the fold, and likewise, it was great to see our patron, Ron Park, enjoy the season as he did with the type of game we played.

On a sad note, we were sorry to learn of the passing of Joe Gibson's wife, Dimps, and offer our commiserations.

All in all, the season was a big step forward, but there's still a lot of work to be done, and there's still Premiership's that need to be won. I am appreciative of the work put in by the Committee, and in particular, Dennis Boucher, for the many hours of work that he does behind the scenes.

We are now back to our rightful position as one of the great Clubs in Queensland, and we clearly have the potential to become THE great Rugby Club in the Sunshine State.

“A” GRADE

David Codey's 1986 "A" Grade team has achieved a place in history as the highest scoring GPS team ever. At the end of the rounds "A" grade won 16 of its 21 games having lost three times to the Premiers Souths, once to Uni and once to Wests when half-back David Philips was sent from the field after 5 minutes.

This team, having missed a place in the Grand Final by being defeated by Souths in the Preliminary Final 16-10, ranks in recent history after Eddie Kann's 1972 Premiership side and the 1976 Grand Final side beaten by Teachers.

Major contributors were Isei Nasiganiyavi (15 tries), Sela Gutugutuwai (9 tries) and Troy McCarthy with 174 points for the year. Troy's commitment to the ultimate goal of a premiership was seen when he willingly rested himself for the final competition round to avoid injury for the finals, with Wayne Riley's club record of 209 points in sight.

Skipper David Codey's Rothmans Gold Medal was a fitting reward for himself and his team, and Boyd Curran's second place in the Rothmans was an astounding effort for his first year in grade.

Undoubtedly David Philips would have figured high in the Rothmans award but for his misunderstanding with referee Barry Leask.

Those who achieved major representative honours are set out elsewhere in this report and are to be congratulated. Troy McCarthy and Rick Stafford's selection in the Queensland under 21's, Damien Reidy's appearance for Brisbane and Isei's appearance for a Presidents XV should not be forgotten.

Ian Rathie's and Dean Pattersen's personal battles with injury did them great credit and they should take pride in their performances towards the end of the year.

The true strength of the "A" squad was seen during the semi-finals series when we drew complaints from the QRU for having too many players on the field at half time. To have twelve fit and keen reserves ready to take the field indicated the true spirit in which the game should be played.

The Mark Brough/Rohan Fuller battle for the inside centre position did those two gentlemen credit. The demeanor shown by the likes of Rick Stafford, John Taylor, Ian Mellors and Brian Forde in competing manfully for a place in the finals team was a credit to themselves and the club.

The input of John Brass to the team and the club generally was again enormous. Keith Sloggett, Evan Collins, Paul Daly and David Colch leant their weight to the common goal of producing winning and enjoyable rugby. Our thanks too to Jackie and Anna the team physios.



In Keith, the club has found a master organiser and diplomat. Keith's players' committee effectively organised all practical support for the team from the Armidale trip to the West League's Club training facilities at the end of the year.

This year, Duncan Mackintosh and Daniel Herbert were selected in the Queensland under 12 team and six of our under 13's made the Brisbane North Representative side — congratulations to Scott Murphy (captain), Chris Franks, Edward Partridge, John Moss, Nicholas Prass and Simon Guilfoyle.

The management committee approached their task professionally. Ashgrove G.P.S. is well organised, well run and well respected throughout Junior Rugby circles. Those of you who saw our seven-a-side carnival would testify to the well-oiled efficiency that exemplifies the way this committee conducts its affairs. Two members of the committee should receive a special mention. Pat Reid, our Secretary, who unfortunately is moving interstate will be missed — thank you for



a job well done. Our Registrar, Rob Melloy, took on this mammoth task and worked tirelessly to ensure the "grass roots" of the club were always informed. All committee members took on their assigned duties with "gusto", they grabbed their portfolios with both hands and got the job done.

Congratulations to Paul Treacy who was elected to the QJRU Management committee this year and subsequently was appointed QJRU Registrar, a formidable task that he has taken on with all the enthusiasm he shows for anything connected with junior rugby.

In 1987 Jeeps Juniors will continue to grow in numbers and commitment — commitment to the parents who entrust their boys to our care; commitment to the boys who want to learn and enjoy rugby; and commitment to the development and growth of Junior Rugby. We look forward to the support of the G.P.S. Old Boys Club in our endeavours.

TREASURER'S REPORT

I present for your consideration and adoption the Club's Audited Balance Sheets and Statements of Income and Expenditure for the thirteen months ended 30th October, 1986 which disclose a 7,899 surplus for the financial year.

The Club's finances were boosted during the year with the receipt of donations from business houses without these donations the club would have suffered a loss of \$16,985. Increases in football expenses, joint ground costs, jerseys, repairs and continuation of the clubs support for representative players have caused the further drain on club funds. Many internal controls were implemented during the year especially in the trading areas but further controls need to be implemented to safeguard Club Funds and secure Club assets. More club members are required to accept the responsibility of organising and controlling various functions of the club, so that the maximum return to the club is achieved. The Committee will continue to seek donations in the future but the availability of these funds is limited and it is very important for the club to secure further fund raising activities to cover the ever increasing costs of maintaining club services.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS AT SEPTEMBER 30, 1986

1. The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and are not adjusted to take account of the current costs of specific assets and the effect of those costs on the income and expenditure for the year.
2. It is practically impossible for the club to establish full commercial controls over most types of income prior to the initial entries in the accounting records. The systems established by the committee ensures that all material items of income are brought to account, however it is the responsibility of each and every member to ensure that club assets and funds are secured for the benefit of all club members both present and future.
3. During the year ended 30th October, 1986, club members' funds have increased by \$7,899 due in part to the larger increase in donations received from business houses. The benefit of these donations was eroded by the ever increasing costs of maintaining the jointly owned Ashgrove Complex, increasing football expenses, high costs of jerseys, and substantial repairs to ground floodlights.
4. The club had entered into a joint venture with Valleys District Cricket Club on a 50% equity basis, to purchase, maintain and operate leasehold improvements, building and plant situated at Ashgrove.
As at October 30, 1986, twelve half yearly repayments of \$2,571.70 by this club, plus interest, totalling \$31,867 were invested by agreement in interest bearing deposits in both clubs' names, with equal participation in the interest earned.
5. The profit on bar trading represents 36% on the bar trading turnover of \$61,815 (35% on \$54,192 in 1985). The controls implemented over the clothing stock resulted in a significant increase in profit from last year.
6. The Club derived very little income from Hotel Raffles. The decrease in revenue from this source of income has established a disturbing pattern over the past few years. This matter should be reviewed by the incoming committee.
7. The loss on functions has increased mainly due to the inclusion of moneys expended for A Grade. These expenditures were self financial through the players committee account and as such do not reflect upon expenditure for all club members as a whole. The income component of the players committee is included in Promotions.

10. Under the present arrangement both Valleys District Club and this club contribute equally to the cost of insurance, rates, repairs and cleaning, however G.P.S. contribute 70% of the cost of electricity due to the requirements of the floodlights. In addition some \$2,593 was expended on top dressing.
