

It gives me pleasure to submit the 1991 Annual Report to you for your consideration.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

I wish to thank all those members of the committee who were actively involved during the season. Coaches and managers, Club sponsors and supporters and the newly re-formed Ladies committee and our physiotherapists and trainers for the commitment and work they have put in during this year. The committee met regularly throughout the season to conduct the business of the club. Unfortunately this year we did not have a Senior Vice-President and two of the Committee positions remained vacant. Those who did serve on the committee therefore had a disproportionate load to carry. Apart from the treasurer, Michael Taylor, who always has a difficult task, others deserving of special mention are naturally Secretary, Jerry Herbert, who in addition to normal secretarial duties, undertook much extra work in and around the Club house and grounds. Frank Jensen, committee man and Club registrar took it upon himself to successfully rejuvenate the King of the Mountain this year, as a result of which this once moribund Club event is sure to regain its fomer status as one of Brisbane's premier runs, not to mention a good money spinner for the Club. Frank also took charge of overseeing the bar. Once again the Club selectors, Alan Taylor and George Bickerstaff put in many hours of hard and generally thankless work assisting coaches with selection and ensuring player numbers were available for games. Anybody looking for a job next year could do lot worse than consider the position of Club selector. Roger Fitzgerald and Louise O'Connor from the Red Hill physiotheraphy centre once again made an invaluable contribution to the club by provision of their excellent physiotherapy services. Paul Green, First Grade coach completes this year his third year of coaching A Grade. These have been three difficult years for the Club and I would like to take this opportunity to thank Paul for perservering when many others may not have.

David Codey, former International undertook his coaching debut as coach of Colts 1 and there is little doubt his presence, together with that of his administrative team, particularly Brogan Mellit and Andrew Dawson, Junior Vice-President, greatly contributed to the success of the Colts and we look forward to seeing that success increased in 1992.

The Ladies Committee was re-formed this year and has already raised funds for certain projects, particularly providing some \$500.00 to assist Anthony Herbert on his World Cup sojourn. Congratulations of course to Anthony Herbert on his selection in the World Cup squad. We look forward to his return bearing the Champions Gold Medal.

Thanks to sports trainers Sean Quinn and Bill Alvers once again showed the necessity of sports and fitness trainers for modern rugby.

Unfortunately our sponsors for 1990 did not continue into 1991. However, St. Pauls Tavern undertook the major sponsorhip role for 1991 for which we are most thankful. Members should recognise who the sponsors are and support them.

1991 must be seen as a watershed year for GPS Rugby Club. The results in the senior Grades were pathetic. Only Third and Fourth grades making it to the finals.

The Colts did extremely well with the firsts as minor premiers and seconds as runners up.

Under 21's were for 1991 an experiment.

1992 must see not only the Colts, but Under 21's (in 1992 a real competition) and most importantly the senior grades, in particular First Grade regain the status which the Club has enjoyed since its inception in its present form in 1928.

Your Executive has taken steps to see that this is not a hollow pious wish but a reality. The first step, a major step for a Queensland Club has been to appoint a largely full time Development Officer. Occupying that position will be Tony D'Arcy. D'Arcy is a product of Nudgee, Brothers and Australian Rugby. He has excellent academic and practical qualifications for this position and in addition thereto has boundless enthusiasm by appointing Tony D'Arcy the committee has also put its credibility on the line.

It is not enough however for the committee to get off its rear end. Renewed success can only come to fruition with players actively working and training. Mr. D'Arcy has indicated in no uncertain terms and in this he is totally supported by the committee that he will not accept half measures from any players in any grades.

The committee has made a commitment by this appointment. The players must make a commitment and to ensure the Club can maintain this commitment supporters will need to also give the Club their time and effort. In this regard a meeting of senior supporters was recently held to outline the committees proposal for setting up a consultant financial committee to oversee fund raising and fund raising sub-committees.

This sub-committee will be separate from management committee and there will be a division of responsibilities. The consultant committee will be a committee whereby the various persons heading fund raising sub-committee with their ideas with their progress, with their budgets. The consultant committee will then, through the treasurer, who will be a member of the committee be able to report back to the management committee in relation to major fund raising areas.

The management committee will be able therefore to devote more of its time to the day to day running of the Club. Communicating with players, coaches, managers and generally boosting the credibility inside and outside the Club. I am pleased to say that Eddie Cann, Onus Maynes, Owen Edwards, Wayne Reilly, Wren Bligh, Jack Duff and Richard Bernays have accepted positions on this committee and have already held initial meetings. We believe the steps we have taken will go along way to restoring the Club's credibility.

On behalf of the Executive I take this opportunity of wishing all members and supporters the best for the coming festive season and join with you in wishing the Club a success for 1992 and the rest of the decade.

A GRADE REPORT

The price of the pursuit of success in any venture in life and particularly in Rugby is hard work, disappointment and the fact that there are no guarantees waiting when it's all over.

Without hard work all you get is failure. Disappointment along the way is inevitable - it's how people handle it that makes them winners or losers. And after all the hard work and disappointment there are no guarantees that ones' endeavours will be rewarded with success.

All of this had particular relevance for the A grade side during 1991. It's necessary to look beyond the seasons results though in order to assess just where GPS is and where it's going to.

To use a Keatingism; 1991 was the losing season GPS had to have. History may well deem it to be the best thing that could have happened because of the many pennies that have begun dropping in the heads of all those who value the GPS club and all it stands for.

The business of creating and running a viable competitive First Division Rugby Club in the 1990's requires hard work, professionalism and vision from all associated with it - the days of getting by with a sub district mentality are gone.

At a time in Rugby's history which sees our National team enthroned as World champions; our provincial sides among (if not) the worlds' best, and the Sydney and Brisbane club competitions the strongest they have been in living memory, the responsibility for flying the GPS flag in 1991 rested with the 41 players who played A Grade, 23 of whom had never played A Grade previously. Only a handful of experienced players (7) played more than 10 games. Lack of funds and infrastructure has inhibited our ability to recruit and keep the types of players who are obviously, desperately needed, to provide the on field direction and role models required by our willing, but inexperienced, younger players.

There are only two ways to get talent. One is to "buy" it and the other to grow it. A successful 1990's club does both. Putting "L" plates on the previous years colts and selecting them in A Grade is not the way to achieve consistent, competitive results - sadly though we were forced to adopt this approach in 1991; with a totally predictable outcome.

Fortunately though, partly because of the heightened sense of urgency forced on us by the 1991 result and partly because of a momentum initiated three years ago which targeted the development of our colts as a key strategy in securing a winning future, the club stands poised to fight its' way back.

The administrative framework and vision necessary to propel GPS into the modern Rugby era seems to be forthcoming and there are now a large number of young and hungry players who have been blooded during 1990 and 1991 and who have the capacity to form the platform for a resurgence in 1992.

It takes time to learn by experience, gain the mental toughness and acquire the physical hardness required to succeed at A Grade level. It was therefore gratifying to see these qualities beginning to emerge towards seasons end - particularly against Souths, Wests and Uni.

It was also gratifying to see the growth in skill and confidence of debutant props Ashly Hall and Jason Reilly who along with Luke Patterson formed a front row capable of matching any in Brisbane. Ashley's domination of World Cup prop Dan Crowley against eventual premiers Souths at Ashgrove was simply outstanding. Jasons' ability and dedication was justly rewarded with selection for Queensland U21.

Aaron Gold was another whose exciting talent was recognised with Queensland U21 selection and, but for some pathetic and disgraceful selection politics, would have made Australian U21 as well.

Stuart Brown was another who gave his heart and soul to the cause and his transfer to Sydney midway through the year was a decided setback.

Another debutant to show an emerging capacity to play at a higher level was fullback Greg Harris - his personal discipline though will need to improve if he's to achieve his real potential.

Other younger players to show courage and ability included John Pye, Danny Shriek, Pat Manahan and Paul Vandeluer.

If supporters found it difficult to watch their team lose time and again I can assure them that their hurt was minuscule compared to that of the players and management team who had to put on a brave face and back up, never giving up, week after week.

Despite being outgunned GPS players continually played with belief and courage and often gave more than their combined experience suggested they were capable of. In this regard senior players Anthony Herbert, Mark Jensen, Clinton Busteed, Tony Mee, Doug McGibbon and Brendan Kieran have my gratitude for the leadership they provided to younger players and their club during a very challenging season.

Congratulations are due to Aaron Gold and Ashley Hall for their best player awards and to Herby for his win in the best and fairest but more importantly for his selection in Australias' winning World Cup squad. The man is a champion in every sense of the word.

Personal thanks are also due to the following people for their contribution to the team and club during 1991:-

Dave Newstead, David Clark, David Phillips, selectors Alby and George, Sean Quinn and physios Roger and Louise. It would have been easy for any or all of these people to simply walk away from the disappointment of the season but they didn't and that takes guts.

As mentioned before, one of the great positives to emerge from the disappointment of 1991 is the large number of players who have now had a sniff of A Grade and who hopefully will want more. Of necessity they have been through a brutally tough learning process but they will be better, harder and meaner players for it.

They need every encouragement and support and a committed and astute administration working for them, and they need other quality experienced players around them. If this is forthcoming then the dream that we all have of seeing our club at the forefront of Brisbane Rugby can be a reality - if not however the future for GPS is a grim one.

2ND GRADE REPORT

An active recruiting drive, netting around 10 new players, combined with a good batch of Colts coming through to grades, promised much for 1991, but unfortunately failed to improve the Club's standing.

A very poor attendance at pre-season training not only turned away some of the new recruits, but players who had been with the Club previously. An important lesson there to be learnt.

A young side, average age 21, were well aware of what lay ahead when beaten soundly by Sunnybank in the first game of the season. To their credit, we bounced back again against North, and although we were shunted all over the paddock in the forwards, we showed tremendous courage and fighting spirit, took our opportunities and won 17-6. There were some individually disappointing performances in attitudes to training, and even some players dropping out altogether; which only enhanced the characters of the guys who stuck it out, and improved along the way. 1st round hidings by Brothers and Souths, 41-0 and 46-0 respectively, were reduced to respective scorelines of 18-10 (2nd rd) and 14-4 (3rd rd), were evidence of the improvement. The lessons learnt will be of great benefit to these young players in the years ahead. My congratulations to Michael O'Kelly, 2nd grade's best and fairest; Justin Steele, best forward and Greg Harris, best back. The bottom line results were:- Played 21 Won 4 Lost 17. Points for 183 Against 594.

On a few occasions, we needed to call on players from lower grades to cover for us, and I would like to thank them for always answering the call, in particular Lachlan Penfold, Mike Clark and Eliz Tequiri. A special thanks to Mick Arnold who gave continued support to the team from the sideline. The teams' Managers, firstly Peter Cunningham, who retired mid-season with the arrival of his first child, and my wife Donna, who through their efforts, made it as professional as possible for the players, and ensured the end of season trip to Jupiters was possible and successful.

On behalf of the players and myself, a special thanks to Sean Quinn, Roger Fitzgerald and Louise O'Connor for all their work during the season. The Club Selectors, Alby Taylor and George Bickerstaff, did a great job and were a pleasure to work with.

My special thanks to Paul Green, whose advice, encouragement and support contributed to an enjoyable working relationship. Like his coaching record of 13 seasons in Sydney's 1st Division, for 11 appearances in semi-finals, the work he does behind the scenes goes largely unnoticed

I would like to thank the players whom I enjoyed coaching enormously, for a season I will look back on with many happy memories

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish Tony Darcy the best of luck in his appointment as Development Officer, as well as the Club in general for 1992 and the years to follows.

3RD GRADE COACHES REPORT

Considering the disasterous start to 1991 with our biggest loss of the season (Sunnybank 25-0) the Thirds showed a lot of guts to eventually finish the competition round equal second with Brothers. The hardest part of being third grade coach was that we couldn't put the same team on the paddock two weeks running which makes our results for the season even more encouraging for the future.

Being one of the closest third grade competitions in years (six teams were still eligible to make a semi final position with the last game to be played). There weren't many easy games which most of our results proved.

Our biggest defeat of the year was 25-0, in the first game of the year with the only other large losses being 15-3 to Uni and 20-0 to Souths coming at the end of the first round.

With the first round over and a few more players coming down to the Club the team really stuck together and pulled off some good wins. Noticeable against eventual premier's Souths, whom we beat 9-7 on their home ground. Highlight of the game being Frank Austin's "lovely" cut out pass on our own line to send Paul Van Eyke, our winger, on a 99 metre run to the try line. One main result for GPS was that we were the only team in the competition to defeat South twice throughout the year.

The addition to the coaching staff of the Darcy brothers (Peter and Tony - ex Brothers Players) was a real bonus to us as their knowledge in the finer points of the game were passed on to the players with very good results. Notably one of the best defensive records in the competition.

To achieve the results we did, reflects on the ability of the players involved in third grade. Our scrum earnt the respect it deserved. From all clubs with players such a Dave Sawyer

(Benz), Danny Powell (Pup), the Taylor brothers, Mick and James, Jimmy Beirne (Jumbo), Paul Vander Leur (Vandy) and Pat Mannerhand (Manners) being our main stayers.

To Vandy and Manners, congratulations on making your "A" grade debuts in a season which saw a lot of third graders advance to higher honours throughout the season.

The backline complimented the forwards, with one of the best halves pairing in the competition (Frank and Locky) taking full advantage of the forwards good work. Our young centres James Noble and Mick Steele had very good seasons while the rest of our backline (wingers and fullback) changed quite often throughout the season. To all the guys who filled the positions each did their jobs well as the results proved. To all involved in third grade throughout the year a big thank you and to all players, let's not let all the good work achieved this year disappear by not supporting the club next year.

Biggest thrill- making the semi finals.

Biggest disappointment - losing the first semi.

Lesson learnt: Premierships cannot be won by training as a team one night a week no matter how good the individual players are.

JUNIOR VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It would be an easy cliche to fall back on if I was to say foundations for a successful 1992 season were laid by this season, but it is something I genuinely believe.

In the balance of a win-loss ratio the 1991 season was an outstanding success, with the off-field first class in the three colts teams.

We won the Colts one minor premiership, were Colts two grand finalists, provided the Spacerack Queensland Rugby Union colt of the year-Richard Graham-as well as supplying Graham, Blake Gold, Peter Lethbridge (under 19), Daniel Herbert and Brad Nixon (under 17) to state teams.

His ability to draw players has to be seen to be believed and I thank him sincerely for 1991 and for the work he already has put into 1992.

Already we have our coaching staff intact for the 1992 seasons, with Codey (Colts one) and Brogan Melit (Colts two) returning to be joined by legendary All Black winger Grant Batts who will be the Colts specialist backs coach.

That we were a successful squad in 1991 on and off the field was a direct reflection on Codey, Melit, Scott Oakhill (Colts three) and Aaron Heinrick. Thank you very much fellas for making the season successful and a lot of fun as well, and thank you to the players who were great company and fine players.

Not enough can be said about the efforts of Codey and Melit.

Codey helped throw a lifeline to the club when we desperately needed an injection of quality players and a more professional outlook.

The Colts felt the immediate benefit of these players, but this season in an important rebuilding year the impact of the likes of Peter Lethbridge, Richard Graham, Black Gold, Paul Innes, Dougal Maynes and co. will be felt in the seniors.

David's influence was evidenced by the Colts fielding three strong teams in 1991 and it is not out of the question that four Colts sides will represent GPS next year.

COLTS 3 REPORT

This problem stems from, not a lack of enthusiasm, but rather the manner in which the QRU set the draw.

This draw lead to people loosing interest, people being fed up with no games. At any one time Colts 3 had no more than 3 or 4 games on the run - how are we the coaching staff, expected to establish a pattern of consistency when the draw continually allowed byes (one, two and even three week byes). Coupled with a number of clubs being unable to field a Colts 3 team lead to our numbers slowly dwindling to the point where phone calls were necessary to even get a team together for Saturdays game.

Our playing staff were possibly the best individuals within the Colts 3 competition, unfortunately these talents were not fully tapped due to the above mentioned problems.

GPS Colts 3 playing staff were on average great footballers. These people are the future of the club and we need to provide a foundation for these people to continue on at the club. This may mean organizing games with various other clubs in an around Brisbane. This is necessary if the Qld Rugby Union continue with the draw they established this year.

The GPS Colts 3 prize winners were 3 players of outstanding ability - our best and fairest Boyd Duff played brilliantly throughout the season and was in our opinion head and shoulder above his peers. The best forward was awarded to Danny O'Sullivan - prop - his general play coupled with his scrummaging ability was again above standard - when coupled with the numerous other props and hookers he constantly stoodout.

Our best back award was given to Chad Vincenze, his individual brillance coupled with his booming boot was a source of constant enjoyment. Chad has another year within our Colts ranks, lets hope that his ability is tapped and used to its full potential. Other players that we feel deserve mention are those players that attended training week in, week out the most notable being RP - Liam Powell - his efforts in all facets of the club - both on and off the field have to be commended, Andrew Crannley, Michael Mackle, Galty and others were again the backbone of the Colts 3 team. The season itself was filled with periods of great enjoyment followed by dissappointment, but as they say "That's Rugby".

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Club's financial results for the year ending 30 September 1991 are somewhat disappointing but not unexpected given the current economic climate and the performance of A Grade this season, although they tried hard.

On the income side, the Club lost its two major sponsors from the 1990 season which made things difficult given their combined sponsorship was worth \$12,500 per annum to the Club. We were able to obtain a new sponsorship from the St. Paul's Tavern who sponsored the Club to the extent of \$5,300. St. Paul's Tavern have agreed to continue this sponsorship into the 1992 season and to this extent I would encourage all members to support this sponsor.

Subscriptions were increased by \$20 to \$60 this year for players by way of including an insurance levy within the subscription. The subscription is still very reasonable when compared to that charged by other Brisbane clubs and the cost to the Club of fielding a player. I would like to remind members that subscriptions for the 1992 season are now due and payable.

During the year the Club made four repayments of \$1,000 on its interest free loans from members. Although this was below our budgeted number of repayments the repayment of the loans still remains our highest priority.

The committee in recent months has taken the view that the Club needs a dramatic turn around in both attitude and approach to the running of the Club if we are to develop further. To this end we have recently appointed a development officer, Tony D'Arcy. We are the first club in Queensland to make this step and it follows in the footsteps of similar successful appointments in New South Wales.

Although this may appear a bold step given the financial results of the 1991 season, I am of the opinion it is a necessary step to turn the current situation around. Further the committee has just appointed/put in place a financial advisory committee whose sole goal is to oversee the raising of additional finance to meet our increased financial requirements.

Of particular mention again this year is the work put in by Frank Jensen as registrar, bar manager, function organiser. I look forward to the continued support of Frank in the upcoming season.

I would also like to thank the work done by Alan Taylor in my absence earlier this year, he is not a bad deputy.

In conclusion, may I extend to the incoming committee and players every success in the forthcoming year.
