Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure the 1992 Annual Report of the GPS Old Boys' Rugby Union Club is submitted for your consideration.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

My personal thanks to all those who supported the club during the 1992 season and year. Particularly the Senior Vice President, David Phillips, Junior Vice President, Andrew Dawson, Secretary, Tony Mollison, Treasurer, Michael Taylor and those committee members who were prepared and able to put in the very large effort required to make the business of this Club a success.

Thanks is too meagre a word to apply in acknowledging the efforts put in by Club Development Officer, Tony D'Arcy this year. You will recall in last year's Annual Report it was mentioned that the committee had, in appointing Tony, taken a positive step to regain for your club a position of prominence in Queensland Rugby. In addition, Tony undertook the job of A Grade Coach. No one has worked harder in the club this year than Tony. His report will doubtless detail the various innovations he has introduced and the successes he has had. Tony will be continuing in 1993. The committee has spoken to him regarding the work load he has taken on. The committee is of the opinion that whilst 1992 was a learning year for all parties concerned. Tony will now be able to trim his non-Development. Innovations which he has introduced this year can and will, to a large extent, be taken over by sub-committees of the Management Committee including, in particular, the newly formed Players' Committee.

Tony has set in train programs which with hard work and dedication on the part of all members of the club, will see the Club achieve an even greater success.

Once again Roger Fitzgerald and Louise O'Connor from the Red Hill Physiotherapy Centre, together with their helpers made a great contribution to the Club. Players for the coming season would do well to remember, however, that Roger felt it necessary at one stage during the season, to upbrade the players for their laissez faire attitude towards the services provided by our physiotherapists. If we do not abide by the simple rules and disciplines of those who are there to put in their time and expertise to help us, then we will have no one to blame but ourselves if these people feel it is no longer worthwhile providing their services.

In addition of course to providing assistance in his own field of expertise, Roger has brought to the club several doctors who have been available on match days to treat player injuries. We were also able to undertake a mass immunisation program for Hepatitis B. These services are invaluable and we thank the various doctors who have assisted.

Thanks of course to all the trainers, including Shaun Quinn who helped at least the higher grades maintain a certain level of fitness.

It must be said, however, more commitment is needed from most players in regard to fitness, particularly when we look at the standard of representative team players and teams realistically vying for premiership honours.

On the coaching scene, Mick Arnold with Second Grade, certainly proved to be an asset and thanks to his determination by the end of the season the team was not only playing reasonable football but had a belief in itself. Third Grade had some difficulties due to their coach's business commitments but thanks to Will Calwell the boys were able to provide tenacious opposition in most cases. Fourth Grade bereft of the old and bold had a very ordinary but nonetheless, enjoyable season.

Once again, David Codey, Grant Batty, Brogan Melit, Dawso, Chubba and a host of Colts workers had a great deal of success with the Colts (see later reports) resulting in the first with a minor premiership, the seconds runners-up and the thirds premiers.

ASHGROVE JUNIORS

Our positive relationship with Ashgrove GPS Junior Club continues. Congratulations to them on their fine efforts on the field this year. Also congratulations to Eric Muir, the incoming President, and our thanks to Rob Melloy for his many hours of interesting liaison between the two clubs. Those of you who have been down to the top field recently will note that four new light poles have now been erected. Full lighting of this field means more room for mid-winter training and adequate lighting for night games and an off-season touch football competition which is presently being run with some 17 teams (again, a Tony D'Arcy initiative, being run by Tim Conroy from the Players' Committee).

NON-COMMITTEE

Although not on the committee this year, the indefatigable Frank Jensen has continued with an enormous workload on behalf of the club. He ran the successful King of the Mountain this season (ran, as in organised!), was also the force behind several successful functions and took control of the management of the Club bar.

In the latter he was ably assisted once again by the Club's long time barman and friend, Roger Dent. Gerry Herbert has retired from the Committee but still continues to carry a great work load in and around the Club. The more people we have of the calibre of Frank and Gerry the more successful the Club will be. In this category one must of course include lone club selector, George Bickerstaff. The constitution provides for two selectors, however George was obliged to carry the load valiantly on his own. Thanks, George. Anyone interested in assisting the Club could do far worse than undertake the position of selector. Certainly, if you are interested in the development of Rugby and look forward to considerable intellectual stimulus every selection night, this is the job for you.

LADIES

The Ladies Committee, re-formed last year, has again had a successful year in running BBQs, raffles, and assisting with various functions. An active Ladies Committee is an important and integral part of any viable Club.

SPONSORS

Sponsorship this year was hampered by the loss of the St. Pauls Tavern in the latter part of the season. The current economic situation makes every sponsorship extremely valuable and the sponsorship sub-committee, headed by David Phillips, has assiduously investigated ways and means of increasing and maintaining sponsorship.

To relieve pressure on existing change room facilities which the proposed extension would create, plans have been prepared for additional changerooms and storage areas to be located behind the sight screen adjacent to the existing clubhouse. Applications have been made in conjunction with Valleys to both Sta e and Federal governments for grants and other monetary assistance for these projects.

V.D.C.C.

We are enjoying an harmonious relationship with Valleys District Cricket Club and in this regard Rod Torkington is to be thanked.

Proposals were put at the beginning of the year by Tony D'Arcy to improve the dressing shed facilities. In ensuing discussions with Valleys a considerable number of matters for the benefit of both clubs were discussed. As a result, we will actively pursuing a third field situated between the present top and bottom fields. Council approval has been gained and the proposed bike track will be redirected to avoid cutting the corner off the proposed third field. With regard to the existing main clubhouse, plans have been architecturally prepared which allow for a total refurbishment and addition of a top floor.

To relieve pressure on existing change room facilities which the proposed extension would create, plans have been prepared for additional changerooms and storage areas to be located behind the sight screen adjacent to the existing clubhouse. Applications have been made in conjunction with Valleys to both State and Federal governments for grants and other monetary assistance for these projects.

The results of these applications should be known towards the end of this year. Once the outcome of the applications is known, the appropriate course will be to call a meeting of the respective clubs and seek member approval of the proposals. These will include obtaining a full licence and subject to a feasibility study presently being undertaken, the installation of poker machines.

Initiatives taken this year by the Presidents of all the senior Brisbane clubs have resulted in the allocation of funds from the Q.R.U in the sum of approximately \$60,000 to be distributed equally between the clubs subject to satisfactory applications being made.

FINANCIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Financial Advisory Committee has had a full year of operation. The committee is headed by Eddie Kann and has amongst others as members, Onus Maynes, Owen Edwards, Jack Duff and Wren Bligh. This committee largely organised a number of very successful fund raising functions during the year including the pre-Test dinner and the golf day. These and other functions will continue in the new year, but will largely be handed over to sub-committees.

The FAC together with the Management Committee is in the process of crystallising the club's management direction for the coming year.

The club's current Management Committee structure is not considered to be the best vehicle to ensure streamlined and successful administration of the club. It is proposed in addition to the Management Committee and Financial Advisory Committee to have an Executive Board. This will consist of two members of the FAC, two senior members of the Management Committee and two external members.

The latter two will be persons who are prominent in the business community or who have administrative and sound entrepreneurial ability. It is intended that the Executive Board will then set the direction of the club and will maintain a prominent and effective profile for the club. The FAC will continue to develop its role and as its name suggests, will develop financial strategies to be taken up by the club to ensure its financial viability. This committee will make particular reference to sponsorship and large fundraising.

The Management Committee will, because of the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act, maintain its present legal position. However a number of the esoteric but nevertheless time consuming long term forward planning and future objective proposals will be removed to the province of the Executive Board.

This will give the Management Committee far more time to devote to the day to day running of the club.

Initiatives taken this year by the Presidents of all the senior Brisbane clubs have resulted in the allocation of funds from the Q.R.U in the sum of approximately \$60,000 to be distributed equally between the clubs subject to satisfactory applications being made.

It is then proposed each committee member will head one or even a number of sub-committees such as: day to day fundraising, ladies committee, player committee, social committee, communications and newsletter committee. The heads of these committees will then co-opt others, players and supporters, to be on sub-committees, thus spreading the workload and making a more disciplined and professional business approach. It is not sufficient to have a professional approach to playing Rugby if a similar approach is not adopted in other facets of the Club.

Thanks must go to David Phillips for pushing for the development of new concepts in club administration.

This report has of necessity been rather lengthy. The projects mentioned are not pipe dreams. However, it must be realised that everything takes time, money and effort. From you, the Club requires the former and the latter in order that we may achieve the remaining of these objectives and thus our ultimate goals.

On behalf of the Executive and all Club administrators we wish all members and supporters and their families thebest for Christmas and the new year and I am sure you join with me in wishing the club great success and further fulfilment of its objectives for 1993 and the coming years.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

Rugby football mirrors much of the drama of life.

Camaraderie, frustration, joy, uncertainty, pain and struggle are all there.

There is more to this game than simply learning the physical skills. It is one thing to possess the ability and another to be able to use it when it counts.

This year we were unable to consistently perform to our ability week in, week out. After a win we were content to be back in the winner's circle, patting ourselves on the back.

It was only after a couple of losses that we again backed our ability and had a go. Our struggle this year made us examine ourselves, our inadequacies and our fears. Given the rich reserve of talent this club possesses we were capable of making the semi-finals (i.e. only another four wins), had we the confidence and belief in our ability to be the premier Rugby club in Australia.

This is by no means a criticism of the First Grade side, as I fully appreciate and was inspired by the way the nucleus of the side has kept playing for the club with pride and dignity through some heart breaking times.

The tremendous courage and famous Jeeps tenacity they have displayed this year on the field and their leadership off the field, combined with a willingness to not be backseat drivers and criticise, but to be the initiators, augers well for our ability to make things happen in the future. Courage, commitment, discipline and, above all, a belief in our destiny is what will achieve it.

By far the best game we played this year, and certainly the most convincing evidence that the team has turned the corner, was our last game of the season at Sunnybank. After about 10 minutes Sunnybank had scored a couple of tries against the run of play. At half-time I asked the players to believe in themselves and to stick to our game plan. The team showed the maturity of a test team by not playing frantic catch-up football.

Pat Manahan scored a try in the corner three minutes into injury time to draw level and Peter Nielsen kicked the goal from the sideline to win the game and hand the wooden spoon on to Easts.

This season proved to me that GPS could put together a competitive First Grade football team that they could be proud of; a team which will provide the foundation upon which to launch an attack on the premiership in the very near future.

Earlier this year we beat the premiers in the second trial and later went very close to beating them in the third round, when Blake Gold popped an Alex Evans protege into space half a dozen times and a technicality disallowed us a push-over try.

The First Grade also had wins against University (runners up) and Wests (minor premiers). In fact University has only scored six more points than us in three games. We also beat both Easts and Sunnybank twice out of three encounters this year.

Congratulations go to Daniel Herbert for being selected for the Queensland senior bench, Australian U21s, Australian U19 and most importantly, the most improved first grade back.

Blake Gold started off the season in 3rd grade and through some determined performances worked his way into First Grade where he made the state U21 team and was subsequently acknowledged with the First Grade's most improved forward award. Both Daniel and Blake have recently been awarded AIS scholarships.

Our backrow of Mark Jensen, Pat Manahan and John Taylor showed outstanding courage, determination and fire and in many ways was the driving force of the team through the season. Up front, Blake Gold, Ashley Hall and Jason Reilly showed their best was yet to come and Michael Ware improved as the season went on.

Clinton Busteed was of great value in the games that he played, while Richard Fay showed tremendous improvement and Leigh Nottingham, whom had not played for three years, added a new dimension to the club.

Halves, Aaron Gold (until he became ill with glandular fever), Tony Mee (who made the most of his opportunities) and Dugald Maynes (making the transition from Colts to A grade) provided effective links with a talented backline.

At five-eighth Peter Nielsen, an unbelievably talented player, showed he was the only player in the Brisbane competition who can kick a left foot field goal!

In the centres, Anthony and Daniel Herbert and Greg Harris. A fullback at first, Greg was starting to play some very clever football towards the end of the season, especially at inside centre.

On the wing, Sean Hemberg — with confidence a player close to representative level. Our most exciting and dramatic attacker; a player with an enormous amount of ability who in so many games was the one who really kept the opposition worried.

At fullback, Rohan Lawrence, the "forgotten man of Rugby" played above himself after his knee surgery.

Off the field, Roger Dent, Frank Jensen and Gerry Herbert did so much in making the players' club nights a success, while Rod Torkington should be proud of the effort he put in on the grounds.

The modern game of Rugby demands the implementation of a multi-coach system. I was very lucky to have a former Queensland halfback look after the backs while I worked with the forwards.

Another vital member of the coaching team was Mick Arnold.

As well as being second grade coach, he was also the assistant first grade coach. The club is indeed extremely lucky to have him. Michael Arnold is the epitome of a club man, helping coach, playing 4th-2nd grade and performing extensive electrical work around the club. He is an amazing man and tremendous to work with.

This year we were also very lucky to have John Taylor come back to Brisbane and to play for the club. It wasn't long before I recognised his tremendous leadership qualities and the respect the players had for him. John led by example and was a tremendously stabilising influence in a young side. He displayed tremendous courage and commitment to the GPS jersey which saw him regularly spend 10 minutes with the doctor having his head stitched.

My personal thanks go to selector George Bickerstaff, Roger, Louise, Nick and Dave (physios), Dr Greg Smith and Dr Lyn Skardoon, Dr David Jenkins (exercise physiologist), David Spillman (dietician and pre-season trainer), David Clark (AIS coach and GPS' last A grade premiership coach) and Sean Quinn (strapper) for their invaluable contribution to the team and club in 1992. Without them my job would have been far more difficult.

In conclusion, further evidence that Jeeps is on the boil again can be drawn from a comparison of the points for and against and tries scored for the 1991 and 1992 seasons.

GPS FINANCE COMMITTEE

Background

The sub committee was formed following a special meeting called by the club in November 1991. The club had rightly taken steps to lift itself off the bottom and in doing so had committed itself to increased costs. The principle object of the finance committee was to ensure that sufficient funds were raised during 1992 to meet the increased costs of running the club.

Members of the Finance Committee

The other members of the committee who have served with me during 1992 are Richard Bernays, Wren Bligh, Jack Duff, Owen Edwards, Frank Jensen, Onus Maynes, Lance Phillips, David Phillips, Wayne Reilly, Michael Taylor and Alan Taylor (in Michael's absence).

Each of these persons is heavily involved in running and managing his own business in a difficult economic climate and on behalf of the club I would like to thank them for the time which they so generously gave to assist me.

Wayne Reilly has returned to Sydney and Lance Phillips has business commitments which will prevent them from serving on the committee next year. The remaining members have kindly offered their assistance again in 1993.

Year in review

We were reasonably happy with the 1992 results. However, as a committee, we believe we were not as effective as we now know we can be.

During 1992 I believe we made two mistakes:

© we did not work closely enough with the club management committee and as a result were not privy to their activities and to their agenda and needs; and © we did not get involved enough in the existing fund raising activities of the club, all of which should have been co-ordinated under the Finance Committee.

We have already taken steps to address these matters and later sections of this report will cover those initiatives.

The pre-test dinner was successfully revitalised in 1992. An inaugural golf day was also held which proved to be very successful.

We now have a series of club functions which will be annual events and which will provide annual income for the club. The annual activities we envisage are:

- a golf day to be held early in the season;
- a major art union to run the length of the season (maybe a motor vehicle);
- Exing of the Mountain run in May; and
- Test dinner the evening before the Brisbane test.

These are events which will, to a large extent, run themselves once the organisation infrastructure is in place. During the year we identified the need to earn larger dollars for the club. We isolated two opportunities which must be developed immediately.

GPS FINANCE COMMITTEE (cont)

They are:

- Detter use and utilisation of membership present and past;
- ☼ Future Guard Insurance sponsorship.

The year ahead

The finance committee will be working much more closely with the club management committee in 1993. Two meetings between the committees have already been held. A representative of each committee will attend the meetings of the other.

We have identified the financial needs of the club in 1993. They divide into three categories:

- Direction Funds needed for day to day running of the club;
- ☼ Priority ground requirements e.g. lighting, irrigation etc. to improve facilities for players; and
- A total redevelopment of the GPS/Valleys sporting complex.

The funds for day to day needs and ground improvements are priorities for the committee. We have identified a programme of activities and fund raising to cover this expenditure. The day to day running and the priority requirements have been costed and planning is well under way for 1993.

During 1992 we identified the need for improvements to the club house, particularly the toilets and change rooms. Work commenced on this but was put on hold when discussions commenced with Valleys to redevelop the complex.

This would be a major undertaking. If redevelopment proceeds it will be with the aid of State and Federal government funds and also the need for the club to raise a significant amount.

Your committee has formed an "executive board" (for want of a better term) to oversee this activity. Two members of the management committee and two members of the finance committee will serve on the board.

We have also been very fortunate to obtain the service of two of Brisbane's most prominent businessmen, both of whom are prominent GPS old boys.

Arch Winning and Bob Nicol have agreed to join the executive board in an advisory capacity to assist not only in the development of the club facilities but also to advise on club development generally.

Arch Winning's sporting record is well known, having represented Queensland from 1945 to 1953 and as a member of the marvellous 1947-48 Wallabies. He also captained Australia against the All Blacks in 1951. Arch has also had a distinguished business career as General Manager and later Group Managing Director of Campbell Brothers Limited from 1965 until his retirement in 1990. Arch Winning still serves on the board of many public companies.

GPS FINANCE COMMITTEE (cont)

Bob Nicol was a fly half for GPS during the early 50s and has also had a distinguished business career. He had 30 years in practice as a Chartered Accountant and is the retired senior partner of the Brisbane office of Priestley and Morris, a national firm of chartered accountants.

Bob Nicol was one of the driving forced behind the Metropolitan Permanent Building Society now Metway Bank Limited. He has been a director of both the building society and Metway Bank Limited for 20 years and has served the past 10 as chairman.

We are extremely fortunate to have their services and I have no doubt they will make a significant contribution.

1992 saw the rebirth of GPS as a viable rugby club. Your committee believes the challenge will not be easy and it will require a commitment to a lot of hard work from all members. The members of the finance committee are prepared to make that commitment.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As with the Club's performances on the field this year our financial position has shown a marked improvement. There is still a long way to go but I believe this year we have made a start.

Income:

On the income side, the figures for canteen trading, functions and fund raising may be a bit deceptive as a significant amount of bar stock was used in the functions held. After an arbitrary allocation I believe the figures are better reflected as follows:

29,202.40 This situation should be resolved by the opening of a separate bar account next year.

In functions and fund raising the improvement can be credited to the following:

The Golf Day:

Functions and Fundraising

A new event on our social calendar organised by Anthony Herbert and Wayne Reily raised \$4,000. This event proved very popular and will be run again next year.

Pre-Test Dinner:

A regular event but which in past seasons was neglected somewhat. Under the control of Wren Bligh and Tony Roberts we returned to Ballymore and raised \$4,000.00. This event will be held prior to the South Africa Test next year.

Special mention must be made of Frank Jensen and his continued work on King of the Mountain and his behind the scenes work at other functions.

Donations and Sponsorships:

The improvement here is a result of the following:

The St Paul's sponsorship contributed \$5,333, but due to the economic climate they found they were unable to contribute past June 92.

CIG provided \$2,000 in addition to various clothing items and the use of their marquee.

Best and Fairest – an increase of \$1,000 on previous years.

Donations of \$1,000 from Roger Dent and the Parkes family.

Transformers Night Club \$1,600.

The Art Union was run by Lance Phillips who I would like to thank here.

Expenditure:

On the expenditure side expenses increased by approximately \$30,000. Of this, \$19,000 relates to the employment of our Development Officer, Tony D'Arcy, who can take much of the credit for the club's turnaround.

Ground expenses increased by \$5,000, of which half relates to the repair of lighting on our Number 1 Oval. Other expenditure increased by \$6,000 which can be reflected in the accounts.

Capital:

On the capital account the club has contributed \$7,000 towards lighting the Number 2 Oval with Ashgrove GPS Juniors. Members loans totalling \$6,000 were repaid.

Conclusion:

I would like to extend my thanks to the Finance Committee comprising Eddie Kann, Owen Edwards, Wren Bligh, Onus Maynes, Jack Duff and Richard Bernays, which was formed earlier in the season and oversaw a number of fund-raising activities during the year. I believe this committee has only scratched the surface this year and that it has largely been a learning experience both for it and management committee.

In recent years the management committee has had a number of meetings with the Valleys District Cricket Club. As a result of these meetings both clubs felt that in order for the club and facilities at Ashgrove to develop there was a need for a major income-producing asset. In our case it was agreed that an improved club house could service this requirement. Both clubs have recently lodged applications for grants with state and federal governments which, if successful, could see us receiving \$350,000 towards a new club house and facilities costing \$750,000. This would leave each club to raise \$200,000.

May I extend to the new Treasurer, committee and players every success in the forthcoming year.
