The 2004 AGM voted unanimously to bestow Life Membership on Bill James, in recognition of his past playing career (Bill played a key role in the 1972 Premiership winning side) and many years of support for the club.

A generous benefactor, Bill was instrumental in helping the club acquire the lease of the former Aussie Rules field which is now our Number 3 oval.

President's Report

Players, Life Members, Supporting Members,

This has been arguably the club's most successful year since the mid-70s. Two teams won grand finals, but more importantly, we were competitive throughout the club and with a bit of luck could have won the club championship, finishing second on 674 points, just 15 points behind Easts. Considering we finished seventh in the club championship last year, that's an effort of which everyone connected with the club can and should be proud.

Our talented coaching staff and team management have worked hard to get us into this position and to ensure that every player has an opportunity to participate at the level that is appropriate to them and to enjoy the experience. This philosophy has contributed in no small way to our ability to attract players, especially in colts. The word has clearly got around that Jeeps is an enjoyable place to play rugby.

Off the field, the club also made great strides, continuing to reduce our debts, scrutinise costs and work hard to increase revenue.

That the club is in better shape than some of its Brisbane peers is due in no small way to the hard work of your management committee, the support of club sponsors and, importantly, the great spirit among the players when it comes to contributing their support and efforts.

The club this year has made two significant investments in computer technology: a new membership database and the hardware and software necessary to run the Fairplay match analysis software, the same sophisticated program used by the Reds and Wallabies. Fairplay enables the Premier coaching staff to analyse performances and play in great detail, and also the creation of "highlights packages" for individual players being considered for higher honours or professional contracts. It's not that we want our players to go elsewhere: but we do understand that it is part of our role to develop them to be the best they are able to be, and if that involves winning a contract elsewhere, then so be it.

In fact we probably need to take another look at our Honour Board, to recognise those players who achieve professional recognition outside of Queensland, while playing from Jeeps.

In the professional era when players are guns for hire on extended contracts the ability to win a chance at state representation is reduced. In the past, players might be selected on form for one or two games if they catch the Queensland selectors eyes, but these days there are fewer opportunities because of contracting constraints.

On the other hand they can now be playing for Jeeps and be recognised by the Waratahs, Brumbies or Force as worthy of a contract while Queensland might not have space in a particular position to accommodate them. Just because the Queensland selectors don't recognise their talent, or can't find room for them, doesn't mean we shouldn't honour their achievement.

So well done to Pat O'Connor on his contract with the Force, and best wishes to Brock James, Junior Pelesasa (Force), Dan Heenan (Brumbies), Tim Atkinson, Tom McVerry, Anthony Mathison and Ben Tune (Reds) for next year's Super 14.

On the Field

After our annus horribilis in grades in 2004 the season just past was an absolute joy, while the Colts numbers and performances again showed our future is in good hands.

Jeeps was able to field four colts sides in 2005 when many other clubs could only field two. This was a tribute to the recruiting efforts of Chris Lane, Alex Pope and others, while they and the whole Colts Management Group deserve credit for the spirit engendered within the Under 19 squad. The policy of treating the colts as a squad, from which teams were picked each week, is one that has great merit and which encourages tremendous espirit de corps.

Three of the four colts teams made it into the finals. Had we manipulated the result of the last game - when two of our colts sides played each other - it would have been four. But that would have been a hollow achievement.

Congratulations to Colts 3 on winning their grand final so impressively, and commiserations to Colts 1 and 2 on falling short. If it's any consolation to Colts 1 (and it probably isn't), it was a fabulous game of rugby, and the skills on display were impressive to watch.

Well done to Aaron Bellamy, Mark Donaldson, Herman Porter and Simon Poole (before his injury) on their selection in the Qld U/19 Team. That was a just recognition of their talents, but also for the performance of the team as a whole.

The important thing from a club point of view is how many colts make the transition into the grades ranks. We've seen in the past that there's a direct correlation between the performance and numbers of colts, and the performance and numbers of grades players a couple of years down the track. So I hope the graduating class of 2005 enjoyed themselves sufficiently to want to continue into grades next year.

Our grades performances this year were a huge improvement on last year, thanks to an influx of more players, more coaches and more team managers. With the arrival of Steve Calder as a coaching mentor in the grades, training sessions were a lot better organised, players enjoyed themselves more and the results showed.

Premier Grade, Reserve Grade and Fifth Grade made it through to finals, but as with the Colts, only one team went all the way. Well done to Scott Lavaring and Tony Mahoney's 5th Grade on lifting the trophy yet again and, more impressively, surviving the celebrations afterwards, when Mad Monday took in the other six days of the week as well.

The performances in Thirds and Fourths were hugely improved this year and the players and coaching staff seemed to have a ball. With an ounce of luck both teams could have been semi-final material.

Mick Arnold and Mark Easton took on one of the hardest coaching jobs at any club, the "Reggie Reserves", and got their team to the Preliminary Final after finishing in second place in the competition. More importantly, they fostered a tremendous pride in being part of the team, so that when players dropped back from Premier they did not feel discarded. They were deserving winners of the Patron's Trophy for coaching excellence.

A special mention also for Paul Biddulph, who this year passed the milestone of 200 grade games for GPS, while also captaining the Australian Deaf side in a win against New Zealand.

Premier Grade played for the first time in a separate competition from every other team in the club, and a competition that is likely to evolve even more in future years. Under Mick Heenan and Marcus Riley the team reached the final four after sweating out the second round of the competition.

It was a season of highs and lows for Premier. We were the first to beat the eventual Premiers Sunnybank - and the first to lose to the wooden spooners, the Sunshine Coast Stingrays. But the style of rugby played by the team helped us attract some of the biggest crowds of the whole competition.

Off the Field

The hard work of the GPS Management Committee and the Players Committee was instrumental in making our home games and club functions such a success in 2005.

Tim and Rob Ferguson were the driving forces behind the move to turn home game days into events, encouraging sponsors to bring their guests along and make a giant party of it. Other clubs were in awe of the crowds we attracted and the new fans realised what club rugby had to offer. Stand by for more big days next year.

Others also worked hard behind the scenes, John Sexton and Phil Perkins on the dawn patrol set up the fields and were still going at the end of the day, Camille Sexton and Jo Perkins preparing the post match food for the Premier teams, the players' committee organising the half time and post match entertainment and the GPS management committee for a hundred different essential tasks.

And of course, our "Mr Reliable", Rod Torkington, the one everyone turns to for help when they need something done.

There are probably only two Brisbane clubs (plus the Sunshine and Gold Coast district teams) who could currently survive withdrawal of this funding without major surgery, if at all. It is vital that our club continues building towards self-sufficiency by looking for new revenue sources and keeping a tight rein on costs.

The GPS family is a wonderful tribe and I have been honoured to serve it for the past three years as club president. However it is time to hand over the reins and I do so confident that the club is in good shape and in good hands.

I thank the management committee for their friendship, support and hard work and urge all club members to get behind the incoming administration and give them your help to keep the momentum going.

TEAM REPORTS

Premier Grade

Premier's season can be split neatly into two parts. The first round was characterised by inconsistency. There was the good (v Wests & Easts), the bad (v Souths & Sunshine Coast) and the ugly (narrow win over Norths and narrow loss to Uni).

A number of first year grades players took their first steps toward what we all hope will be long and successful careers as GPS players. Among them Byron Roberts, Jon Anderson and Sean Graham deserve special mention. In a similar vein, many of our players experienced their first taste of finals football in the narrow loss to Brothers. I am certain that all involved in the game will draw from that experience.

Special mention too to Brendan Sexton, Geoff Ingram, Donovan Slade and Sam Thies, who all passed the 50 game milestone this year.

Reports from Argentina indicate that Anthony Mathison, Tom McVerry and Tim Atkinson were among the best performed players on the Reds tour of Argentina. As most of you will appreciate, all these men require is an opportunity in the Super 14 to show their ability. We also wish Junior Pelesasa, Brock James and Pat O'Connor all the best in their endeavours for the Western Force in 2006. While we are sorry in some ways to see them go, all gave great service to GPS this year and we know that they can all make an impact in the Super 14.

Preseason for 2006 started up on 14 November and the depth through the grades will be further enhanced by another influx of youngsters fresh from Colts. The relative youth of the playing group makes for a vibrant atmosphere and the challenge next year for every grade will be to translate that energy and enthusiasm into results on the field.

Round 1 Telstra Premier Rugby - Souths 53 GPS 12

Jeeps campaign for the 2005 Telstra Premier Rugby competition got off to the worst possible start with a convincing 53-12 defeat at the hands of a bigger, stronger and faster Souths side.

The game was only a couple of minutes old when referee Rod Brockett awarded Souths a penalty try for a high tackle by Donovan Slade that had taken the Souths winger into touch short of the line.

It didn't improve much from there, as the Magpies dominated possession and quickly converted turnover ball to an overlap by spreading it wide and stretching the Jeeps defence to breaking point.

Traffic was so one-way that the score blew out to 41-0 before Jeeps got on the board, courtesy of a well deserved try to Slade who had worked hard all evening.

Hooker Seamus Fraser added a second, converted by Andrew Thorpe, but the Gallopers couldn't stop Souths from passing the half century before fulltime.

The injury toll made the scoreline even harder to bear, with blindside flanker Marty Perkins off to hospital with a badly dislocated shoulder, and skipper Steve Miller coming off early with a leg injury.

Round 1 - GPS 22 Norths-QUT 12

With such a long injury list it was always going to be tough for Jeeps against a resurgent Norths-QUT, coming in with their tails up following a couple of wins under new coach Chris Roche and after a lot of off-season recruiting.

Jeeps started well enough but after a bit of arm wrestling Norths were first to score with a converted try. The Gallopers struck back with the forwards driving Seamus Gay over in the corner but Donovan Slade was unable to convert and the teams went to halftime at 7-5.

Norths struck first again in the second half and at 12-5 up were looking the stronger of the two teams. However Slade charged down a kick and successfully regathered to score and convert his own try to level the scores.

A penalty goal by Slade and a try by a determined Mark Bennedick, converted by Slade, settled the issue in favour of the Gallopers.

Scrumhalf Tim Usasz was named the Metro Nissan & Renault GPS Man of the Match for a busy display, and won a weekend loan of a sponsor's vehicle for his efforts.

Round 1 - GPS 31 Wests 15

The Gallopers retained the Hammond-Taylor Shield with a convincing 31-15 victory over Wests at Ashgrove, scoring five tries in their best display of the season so far.

Dominant at scrum and lineout, the Gallopers shrugged off some pre-match backline reshuffles to overcome the Bulldogs with some determined defence, that kept Wests tryless until the game was won.

Donovan Slade, playing his 50th Premier Game for Jeeps, won the Metro Nissan Man of the Match award for a strong display which included a crucial try, some last gasp defence and some ferocious hits.

Reds prop Anthony Mathison, Tim "Horse" Heenan, captain Steve Miller and fullback Brad Jarro also posted five pointers, while Slade kicked three conversions and a penalty.

Round 1 - Sunnybank 36 GPS 17

Jeeps paid the price for losing two players to the sinbin as competition leaders Sunnybank turned a 12-17 halftime deficit into a 36-17 victory over the Gallopers at Sunnybank.

Flanker Brendan Sexton was first to get a yellow card, although his binning for interfering with the ball after a penalty seemed harsh. His absence when Jeeps were leading 14-0 allowed the Bank to pull back two tries.

Centre Donovan Slade was binned in the second half for a shoulder charge, after earlier being warned for a high tackle. In his absence the Dragons posted another two tries and streaked away for a deserved win

The Gallopers had shown tremendous commitment to bottle up the dangerous Sunnybank side for three quarters of the game, with the Jeeps forwards claiming the first try with a drive over scored by hooker Seamus Fraser and Chris Wright following up with a well-worked five pointer out wide. Slade added the extras and a penalty for the 17 first half points.

But once Sunnybank got in front they were able to get their wide, fast game going and piled on the tries as they gained confidence.

It was the only low point of the day as the Gallopers won everything else - a rarity against Sunnybank in recent years.

Round 1 - GPS 19 Brothers 19

Jeeps had a chance to win with a fulltime penalty goal but had to settle for a 19-all draw with Brothers in their first round match at Ashgrove.

Donovan Slade's kick just drifted wide and referee Andrew Coles blew fulltime, in a match where a draw was probably the fairest result.

Mark Bennedick opened the scoring for the Gallopers with a well deserved try, converted by Slade, but Brothers struck back with a converted try of their own, followed by a second which enabled them to lead 12-7 at halftime.

The Gallopers struck back in the second half when Steve Miller was driven over and Slade again converted, but Brothers refused to lie down and were soon back in front 19-14.

Each side lost a player sent off in the same incident, when Geoff Ingram was red carded for a careless elbow and his Brothers tormentor followed for retaliating.

Bennedick scored a second try to bring Jeeps level, but the conversion missed and the teams had to settle for an honourable draw.

Ashley Elphinston was voted the Metro Nissan-Renault Man of the Match for Jeeps, winning the loan of a vehicle on the following weekend.

It was AWX sponsors day and Ladies Day, with a combined marquee and plenty of atmosphere on the cricket nets side of the ground.

Round 1 - Easts 14 GPS 31

Jeeps hooker Nick Churven claimed a hat trick of tries in the Gallopers' 31-14 win over Easts at Easts in Round 1.

It was a commanding display by the Gallopers, against a side that made the finals of the pre-season competition but that was never given a opening by Jeeps in this match.

Jeeps dominated possession and scored five tries to two, with the back three of Peter Stevenson, Byron Roberts and Chris Wright giving Easts plenty of problems out wide, while they also struggled to contain the Gallopers' midfield.

Junior Pelesasa opened the scoring for Jeeps, busting them open in midfield and scoring a long range try, followed up soon after by a forward drive that gave Churven his first five pointer.

Unfortunately Donovan Slade had left his kicking boots at home and the Gallopers had to settle for a 10-0 lead.

Stevenson did one of his Houdini acts to shrug off a number of tackles before slipping a nicely bounced ball backwards to Slade, who snapped it up at fully pace on the half volley and dotted down under the posts to give himself an easier kick.

Jeeps went to the break at 17-0 and went further ahead in the second term with Churven claiming the points from another forward drive. Slade converted and the game looked settled at 24-0.

However a try from a charged down kick gave Easts a sniff, and then a fine individual effort by veteran Haydn Long for Easts brought them up to 24-14.

However Jeeps flyhalf Mark Bennedick put the issue beyond doubt when he darted through a half gap and slipped the ball to Churven who cantered over for his third try.

For Jeeps Reserve grade halfback Gareth Morris acquitted himself well when he got the callup to replace an injured Tim Usasz, while Bennedick had another strong game. In the forwards Tom Couper continued to expand his wide running game from lock and No 8 Ashley Elphinston was again a handful for the defence.

Round 1 - GPS 17 Sunshine Coast 26

The Sunshine Coast Stingrays won their first match of the Premier Rugby competition when they defeated Jeeps 26-17 at Ashgrove in Round 1.

The team, coached by former Jeeps Premiership winning player and coach David Clark, were worthy victors on the day, having played the smarter football and showed determination to win throughout the match.

The Sunshine Coast were 5-8 leaders at the break, but Jeeps added two quick tries to move to 17-8 and were seemingly ready to put the game beyond doubt.

But the Stingrays refused to concede defeat and lifted their intensity when Jeeps looked to be lifting their foot off the pedal.

Where Jeeps should have been the ones to finish the stronger, it was the Sunshine Coast that kicked away, regaining the lead and finishing more strongly than Jeeps.

Each side scored three tries, but the kicking boot of Stingrays fullback Michael Piper made the difference.

For Jeeps, tries were scored by Nick Churven, Donovan Slade and the Metro Nissan & Renault GPS Man of the Match Seamus Gay. Slade kicked one conversion.

Round 1- Gold Coast 38 GPS 12

An injury depleted Jeeps was out-muscled by reigning Premiers Gold Coast 38-12 when the two sides met in a night game on the Coast.

Despite the margin, the Gallopers would be proud of their gallant effort against the odds. It was a complete turnaround in attitude and commitment over the previous week's performance against last placed Sunshine Coast.

Missing many frontline players including Tim Heenan, Nick Churven, Steve Miller, Peter Stevenson and Tom McVerry (all injured) and Junior Pelesasa (Australia A). Jeeps also had to contend with losing

scrumhalf Tim Usasz in the first two minutes with a leg injury, and then his replacement Gareth Morris, who'd earlier played the whole reserve grade game.

Thankfully Reds prop Anthony Mathison backed up from the midweek game against the Junior All Blacks, to face a torrid night in the scrum against the Coast's very big and strong pack.

All of the Coast's points came from wearing down the Jeeps resistance, while Jeeps points were scored by wing Byron Roberts and replacement back Jon Anderson. Mark Bennedick kicked a conversion.

The Jeeps' man of the match probably would have been a tie between flanker Brendan Sexton, who wasn't really match fit but played himself to a standstill until he was replaced two thirds of the way into the game, and centre Donovan Slade who was always trying to create opportunities in the midfield. Mathison would have been close behind them, along with lightweight lock Sean Graham and game hooker Cammie King, playing his first game back in weeks.

Round 1 - GPS 19 University 21

A penalty goal almost on fulltime snatched a 21-19 victory for University in Round 1 clash with The Gallopers at Ashgrove.

With Jeeps leading 19-18 with only minutes to go, University flyhalf Chris Lyons' shot at field goal was heroically charged down by Seamus Gay, only for play to be called back for a scrum penalty in front of the posts. Lyons had kept Uni in the match with penalty goals and made no mistake with this one, shattering The Gallopers hopes of a desperately needed win.

Jeeps scored three tries to two and had enough chances to win the game, but both sides were guilty of fumbling scoring opportunities.

For Jeeps. No 8 and former University player Ashley Elphinston opened the try scoring with a powerful effort early, but Uni struck back with a converted try and a penalty to lead at halftime.

Another penalty stretched the University lead to 13-5 but a fine solo try by club captain Chris Wright, where he beat his man with strength and pace, chip-kicked over the defence and then won the race to the ball in the in-goal lifted the Gallopers, especially when Donovan Slade slotted the difficult conversion.

Jeeps retook the lead when Byron Roberts scored, also converted by Slade, however a University try and the match winning penalty sank the Gallopers at the final bell.

The match marked the 50th Premier Grade appearance for Sam Thies.

Round 2 - GPS 52 Souths 13

Jeeps turned the tables on Souths in round 2 to record a 52-13 win at home, scoring eight tries - three of them to Junior Pelesasa.

It was a complete contrast to the first round match, when Souths steamrolled the Gallopers 53-12. Reserve Grade and Third Grade did the same, turning around their first round defeats by the Magpies to post good wins.

Jeeps got off the mark early in the Premier match when flyhalf Mark Bennedick went through a gap to score the first of his two tries. Souths came back shortly after with a seven pointer to lead briefly, until the Jeeps machine started to roll.

Hooker Nick Churven was driven over, and then Junior got the first of his trio. Tom Couper and Ashley Elphinston also posted five pointers, while fullback Adrian West - the Metro Nissan & Renault GPS Man of the Match - kicked six conversions.

Westy had an excellent game, involving himself in everything and kicking well in general play. The Jeeps pack was also magnificent, led upfront by Churven and props Ryan McDonald and Anthony Mathison. The backrow of Couper, Elphinston and Steve Miller were also strong on attack and in defence.

Round 2 - GPS 45 Norths-QUT 27

Jeeps turned a halftime deficit into a bonus point win when they defeated Norths-QUT 45-27 at Shaw Sportz, scoring seven tries in the process.

The resurgent Norths gave the Gallopers a hard time in the first half, matching them try for try and getting up quickly to force Jeeps into error.

Hooker Nick Churven scored the Gallopers first try, followed by wing Chris Wright and centre Junior Pelesasa. But fullback Adrian West only managed to convert one of the scores, leaving the home side ahead 19-17 at the break.

Norths began kicking more for field position in the second half while Jeeps began to knuckle down to winning the game by giving the opposition fewer turnover and intercept opportunities.

Another try to Pelesasa followed by a tryline dash down a vacant blindside by prop Anthony Mathison after a break by Pelesasa, both converted by West, put them into a winning position. However Norths refused to concede defeat until Jeeps scrumhalf Tim Usasz, running off an inside ball from No 8 Ashley Elphinston in a clever scrum move, managed to outpace the defence to score the clincher, also converted by West.

Flyhalf Mark Bennedick put the icing on the cake when he darted through some tiring defence to score under the posts and give West his fifth conversion right on fulltime.

Jeeps were well served by Geoff Ingram in the lineouts, while the scrum looked good all game and the forwards drove and defended strongly.

Round 2 - Wests 19 GPS 13

The boot of Julian Huxley enabled Wests to put a serious dent in the Gallopers' semi final aspirations with a 19-13 victory at Sylvan Rd that cemented the Bulldogs' third placing.

Huxley kept Jeeps on the back foot with his kicking for field position and kicked the two penalty goals that was ultimately the margin between the two sides on the scoreboard.

The first half was nothing to strike fear into the competition leaders Sunnybank and Gold Coast, as both Wests and Jeeps struggled to overcome a high mistake rate.

Wests led 9-6 at halftime with Jeeps' goalkicker Adrian West in the sinbin, but they failed to take any further advantage until a converted try midway through the second half took the score to 16-6 and a penalty stretched the lead to 19-6.

Jeeps struck back with a try in the corner by replacement flanker Brendan Sexton, converted from the sideline by West, after a lineout win was kept in the forwards, but couldn't take it any further before time ran out.

Among Jeeps' best was hooker Nick Churven, who was everywhere in defence.

Round 2 - GPS 22 Sunnybank 21

Jeeps ruined Sunnybank's perfect record for the season in Premier Grade with a 22-21 bonus point victory over the previously unbeaten Dragons that completed a clean sweep for the Gallopers on the day.

Jeeps scored four tries to three, but could have gone down in the last minute when the Dragons were awarded a kickable penalty with only minutes to go. Their kicker Ben Gollings had kicked three from three on the day and is the competition's leading points scorer.

However the Dragons' decision to opt for the lineout in the hope of winning the game and scoring a bonus point try - as they have in every other Premier game this year - proved misguided and the Gallopers successfully defended their slim lead to full time.

The match was won in the forwards, where Jeeps disrupted the opposition scrum all day and the Gallopers eight frequently bustled the Dragons into error.

Hooker Nick Churven scored two tries for The Gallopers, to claim the Metro Nissan & Renault/Caxton Hotel Jeeps Player of the Day awards, with another non-stop effort.

Donovan Slade grabbed a five pointer with an intercept try that took the Gallopers out to a 22-14 lead, while Junior Pelesasa used his strength to score the opening Jeeps try.

Tim Atkinson made a welcome return to The Gallopers off the bench in the second half, which gave them the boost they needed in the run home.

Fullback Adrian West scored the decisive conversion that meant the difference.

The day was declared "Super Secco Saturday" in honour of Jeeps flanker Brendan Sexton, who celebrated 50 Premier Grade games by leading the Gallopers onto the field through a tunnel of Ashgrove-GPS Juniors, where he'd played over 200 games before joining the senior ranks.

Round 2 - Brothers 20 GPS 27

The speed of Tim Atkinson and the boot of Brock James created a crucial bonus point 27-20 win for Jeeps over Brothers at Crosby Park in Round 2.

The return of those two from injury along with Reds flanker Tom McVerry and exciting young fullback Peter Stevenson, who came off the bench to also play their first matches for Jeeps for some time, augurs well for the Gallopers as they press for a place in the final four in a tight battle with Wests and Brothers for 3rd and 4th place.

Jeeps had galloped away to a 17-0 lead midway through the first half thanks to excellent ball control and the power of Junior Pelesasa combined with the silky skills of fellow centre Atkinson.

Pelesasa, who hadn't been expected to play, crossed for Jeeps' first try after 10 minutes spent battering the Brothers' line and three several spurned opportunities to kick for goal.

The Gallopers were in again soon after when Atkinson slipped a sweetly timed pass to Pelesasa that even he couldn't believe, judging by his hesitation in putting the ball down for the try. Donovan Slade converted to take the score out to 12-0.

Feisty Jeeps half Tim Usasz was in for Jeeps' third try soon after, darting from the base of a ruck, but Slade's conversion attempt was a shocker.

The tide of the game then finally turned in Brothers' favour when Pelesasa was sin-binned for a high tackle and at the same time the Brethren finally began to win more ball. They fought back to be 10-17 with a converted try and a penalty by halftime.

In the second half James made his first appearance for Jeeps, coming on at flyhalf for the fast improving Jon Anderson. James immediately made his presence felt with a nicely struck penalty goal and some powerful kicking in general play, both of which Jeeps has been lacking this season.

But Brothers were not to be denied and came back with another converted try and a penalty to tie the scores at 20-all.

They had a chance to win the game with a penalty kick and then a three on one overlap attacking the Jeeps line. But a combination of Brothers' over-enthusiasm and gallant Jeeps defence denied them.

Instead it was Jeeps who broke the deadlock right on fulltime when Atkinson made another of his lightning breaks to unload to Pelesasa, who made valuable ground before slipping the final pass to Slade, a jubilant try scorer under the posts to make the kick easier for James.

Round 2 - GPS 48 Easts 12

Another much needed bonus point win for The Gallopers built on the foundation of a dominant forward pack, which gave Jeeps the possession needed to overcome a troublesome Easts.

Centre Junior Pelesasa crossed for two tries of the seven Jeeps tries, and was instrumental in others, including the opener by winger Donovan Slade after just five minutes. Fly half and Jeeps man of the match Brock James converted to put Jeeps 7-0 up, but Easts struck back quickly with a try of their own.

However it was all Jeeps from then on, as the class in the Gallopers backline and the strength of the forward pack shone through.

Try happy hooker Nick Churven scored his ninth try of the year, while the forward domination was further demonstrated by a classic pushover try by No 8 Ashley Elphinson. Fullback Peter Stevenson scored a slick try off a deft pass from Tim Atkinson, who scored a clever try of his own.

James added five conversions and a penalty in a controlled performance at fly half that earned him the Nissan Metro & Renault Jeeps Man of the Match award.

Round 2 - Sunshine Coast 5 GPS 78

Jeeps gained sweet revenge for the first round loss at the hands of the Sunshine Coast Stingrays with a 12 try 78-5 romp at Caloundra to keep their semi-finals hopes alive.

However the win came at a price: Junior Pelesasa off to hospital with a possibly season-threatening shoulder dislocation.

The Stingrays were worthy victors in the first round, but this time around they were severely depleted by injury and Jeeps was on a mission and focused on the job at hand.

The match was played at night in a driving wind, which Jeeps had at their backs in the first half and used well, with Tim Atkinson putting in some long kicks to keep the Stingrays pinned down in their own territory.

The demolition started early when the forwards drove the Stingrays eight backwards for the first of two tries to hooker Nick Churven, making him the leading try scorer (11) for Premier Grade this year.

Winger Byron Roberts scored almost half that many in the one game with his five tries against the Stingrays, while Peter Stevenson was close behind with three. Tom Couper and Jon Anderson grabbed one each while Donovan Slade stepped up to the plate in the goalkicking department, slotting nine conversions.

Round 2 - GPS 20 Gold Coast 22

A courageous effort by the Gallopers secured them a valuable bonus point and clear fourth placing with one game to go in Telstra Premier Rugby.

The Gallopers dug deep to come within two points of toppling the Premiers, in a game that could have gone either way.

It was nip and tuck for the first 20 minutes as both sides grappled for advantage, the Gallopers managing to hold their own up front against the monster Breakers' pack. However a charged-down kick, one of several in the first half, led to the first Breakers' try, and another five pointer soon after had them 10-0 up, running with a strong breeze.

A Donovan Slade penalty on halftime gave the Gallopers the encouragement they needed to turn with the wind at their backs, but it was the Breakers who scored first to jump to a commanding 17-3 lead. To their credit, the Gallopers consolidated and a try to Nick Churven, followed by a sharp run by Tim Atkinson that led to a Steve Miller try, converted by Slade, and the Breakers' lead had been pared back to 17-15.

The Breakers hit back with a second try to Josh Fuimaono down an unprotected blindside and the game looked to be as good as over. But the Gallopers stuck to their last and defended doggedly, repelling raid after raid by the Gold Coast's huge forward pack. And the persistence was rewarded when an Atkinson kick through led to a spectacular try by Slade. Unfortunately his conversion attempt was wide and a draw went begging.

The bonus point for losing by seven or less lifted the Gallopers a point clear of Wests, who slipped to fifth on the day, with only next week's game against eighth placed University remaining.

A positive for Jeeps was again the performance of the forwards, who tackled magnificently and held their own at scrum and lineout. Ryan McDonald was the Nissan Metro & Renault Jeeps Man of the Match.

Round 2 University 12 GPS 46

Jeeps qualified for the semi-finals with a dominant display over University in the round 2 match at St Lucia, scoring seven tries to two to win 46-12.

Wallaby sensation Drew Mitchell had put University into the lead early, using his pace for a nicely worked try. However that was the only thing the students had to cheer about, as Jeeps set about demolishing their scrum, dominating the lineout and racking up the tries to lead 29-5 by halftime.

Donovan Slade scored the first five pointer for the Gallopers, powering through three tacklers to score his try. Brock James converted, the first of four conversions and a penalty that he kicked during the day.

Jason Hynes was next to score, after a clever Tim Atkinson tapped a loose ball with his foot and it bounced off a Uni player and into the arms of Hynes. Atkinson scored for himself shortly after, pulling in an intercept then outpacing Mitchell, who left the field with a hamstring strain.

Quick hands across the backline to Chris Wright led to Jeeps' bonus point fourth try, converted by James, and a commanding 29-5 halftime score.

University called for uncontested scrums at the start of the second half, so Jeeps took the opportunity to rest props Ryan McDonald and Anthony Mathison as the match fell away as a real contest.

Ashley Elphinston scored the first try of the second half for Jeeps, while Peter Stevenson added two more spectacular efforts to wrap up the scoring after Uni had posted a second consolation try.

Minor Semi-Final - Brothers 37 GPS 32

An intercept try by Brothers only minutes from fulltime with Jeeps on all out attack ended the Gallopers season for 2005 in the minor semi-final at Ballymore.

With Jeeps attacking the Brothers line, trying to bridge a five point deficit, Brothers' Kane Allen took a chance and rather than try to defend a three man overlap, went for the intercept and turned possible defeat into victory.

Brothers' fifth try put them 10 points clear and, although Tim Usasz capped a typically dogged display by scoring a try on the bell, it was not enough as Brothers ran out 37-32 winners, qualifying to meet the Gold Coast in the following week's Preliminary Final.

Jeeps started brightly enough, with Brock James slipping a sweet pass to Donovan Slade for him to score in the corner in the 11th minute. James converted the try, the first of his three conversions and two penalties that helped keep Jeeps in the match.

Brothers struck back with the equaliser six minutes later, but Jeeps regained the lead in an attacking raid when James fed Tim Atkinson, who made enough of a break to create the opening for Usasz to take the inside ball and score under the posts.

Penalty goal exchanges made up the rest of the half, which finished with Jeeps 17-13 in front.

Jeeps had been well served by James, who directed play well in the midfield and used his strong right boot to advantage. However Reds' flanker David Croft was making life difficult for the Gallopers, creating a number of turnovers, slowing Jeeps ruck ball and getting to the breakdown early enough to win several penalties.

The Jeeps forwards also proved a stronger unit at the set pieces, causing the Brothers eight to ponder how they'll fare when they meet the Gold Coast's monster pack next weekend.

The second half went badly wrong for the Gallopers.A try to Brothers speedster Ant Sauer put Brothers in front until James equalised, but two more tries by the Brethren had Jeeps in deep trouble at 20-32 behind with time running out.

A wayward pass in the Brothers in-goal gave a five pointer to the alert Byron Roberts and new hope to Jeeps with the lead cut back to 27-32.

However the intercept try put the match out of their reach, leaving the Gallopers to lament a disappointing end to their season.

Reserve Grade

Under the direction of Mick Arnold and Mark Easton, Reserve Grade had an excellent season, finishing second on the ladder at the end of Round 18 with 13 wins, 1 draw and 4 losses.

After a tough start to the season the boys had one win from four games, before finding their feet and stringing together 12 wins on the trot. The success was built on strong performances in the pack, making yards up the middle with strong ruck and maul work, and good picking-and-driving, together excellent commitment by the whole team in scrambling defence.

With a second place finish, Reserve Grade played the major semi-final against Brothers. GPS played the entire second half a man down after an unjustified red card was handed out. The boys dug very deep and with a man down the opposition were still not able to cross our line. GPS led 6-3 with four minutes to go. But brothers got themselves into good field position and converted two penalty attempts in the dying minutes, the second being posted after the final siren to win 9-6.

The Preliminary final was played the following Sunday night against an unpredictable Souths team. Unfortunately the ball did not bounce our way that night, and our error rate was too high for finals rugby. Souths won 13-6 to finish our season.

With around 50 players running on for Reserve Grade the success was due to far too many players to mention. Their ability to work together as a team each week with consistent changes was a major contributor to their success.

Sean Graham was named Best and Fairest following the weekly points allocation. Adrian West, who played numerous games in Premier Grade was named best back for his consistently solid performances at fullback. Our halfback, Gareth Morris deserves a mention for his work-rate around the park, and we lost count of the number of try-saving tackles he pulled off during the season. Club stalwart Paul Biddulph played his 200th grade game during the season, and has now decided to hang up the boots after a long career at GPS out-performing his opposing front rowers.

There was a great injection of skills and enthusiasm from the colts ranks this year, and all of the young players also showed significant development during the season.

The success was built on a team spirit that was clearly apparent this year, largely helped by the involvement of large support team involved.

Paul Cramsie provided invaluable assistance as team manager and Steve Calder as Coaching Coordinator made a real difference, together with the support and teamwork amongst the whole coaching staff. John Richards and John Wiltshire provided sponsorship assistance, and John Richards also gave general management assistance and help running water on game day along with Rod Spark and Craig Carter which was much appreciated, as was the continued assistance of Madonna and her team from Allsports Physio.

The first game of the second round saw Jeeps once again put in a punishing display against last year's premiers, running out winners 57-7. Ben Tennant score a personal high and a club 3rd grade record with his 32 point haul which included three tries, one penalty and 7/8 conversions.

The following week saw the 3's travel to the Gold Coast to play Redlands. After a solid start to the game Redlands proved to be too strong and ran out winners 19-12. This game saw the return from suspension of James Connolly and his impact was almost immediate with some strong defence and running.

Fourth Grade

2006 is looking good with growth hopefully to U/17 and 300+ players, and numbers starting to build multiple teams in the lower Sunday ages. We are looking to build on this year's 16's and to build this competition. More teams = more fun for our players.

This is my last report, I thank junior rugby for seven years of support and association. It has been encouraging to not only see our club grow but the game in general.

Thank you to my committee and let's support the new faces coming into the Creek.

Treasurer's Report

The 2005 year has been financially successful for our club.

Our net profit of \$41,290 is a significant improvement on the 2004 figure of \$6,821 and reflects progress in almost every facet of the club operations.

At the end of the 2004 season, we held a meeting of interested club supporters, where problem areas and possible opportunities were discussed. The biggest single development from that meeting was the obvious willingness of people to volunteer and to provide support and expertise to staff and committee.

As a result last season we had a full complement of coaches and managers, a well organised committee, a hard working and effective general manager and a large number of volunteers, both from the parent body and current players as well as a core of long term supporters.

The efforts of all these people cannot be adequately quantified in financial terms, but our financial success is directly linked.

Player Subscriptions

Of all areas of concern, this has been the most satisfying result. Happy players who recognise the effort and organization of the club and coaching staff are prepared to pay. 2004 was a big improvement on past years but in 2005 we achieved almost 100% success in collecting subs. Consequently fees rose from \$32,167 to \$47,781, helped also by the addition of an extra colts team.

Canteen Arrangement

For 2005 a new canteen arrangement was trialled, where the Junior Committee took responsibility for the canteen on our behalf and paid a monthly licensing fee plus a share of profits at year end.

As a consequence, while gross profit was almost identical to 2004 results, bar sales appear to be some \$10,000 lower.

Thank you to the Junior Committee for exploring this option as a means of solving the problems of running a joint bar operation. We are currently reviewing arrangements for 2006.

Sponsorship

We had a significant improvement in sponsorship this year rising from \$60,000 to \$80,000. This is a vital and much appreciated source of income for the club and reflects the belief of our corporate supporters that there is real value in sponsoring a Brisbane rugby club.

It is important though, that as members and supporters we recognise that our sponsors deserve our support. It is a business arrangement and they are entitled to expect some return for their outlay.

QRU Grant

The QRU again paid \$80,000 towards the cost of running the Premier Competition and this is also a vital source of revenue.

Quite rightly the QRU expects professionalism from member clubs in return for this financial support. These funds are utilised to support our retention of a General Manager, Club Development Officer and Premier Grade coach in addition to the usual costs of maintaining the team and grounds.

This figure will not rise in 2006 and perhaps beyond. Our costs will, which means it will be important to increase our other sources of revenue.

Pre Test Function

The success of the sellout Pre Test Function this year gave the entire club a sense of satisfaction.

The event was superbly organised thanks to the efforts of Mike Thies and Rod Torkington, but naturally there were a lot of other praiseworthy participants.

Mike allowed himself a long lead time and organised our guest speaker and venue very early. From there his persistence and attention to detail ensured a day that was financially rewarding but also importantly, had everyone waiting expectantly for the 2006 event. Mike has again volunteered to assist, so book early!

Golf Day

Committee man Greg Geraghty volunteered to run the 2005 Golf Day which featured the prize of a motor vehicle from our principal sponsor Norris Motors, if a hole in one was achieved.

The day was successful financially and was very enjoyable. Thanks again to Greg for being the driving force and for his good organisation.

Expenses

Overall, expenditure rose from \$247,688 to \$293,068 this year, but 2005 does include a write-down of non-current assets of \$10,491. We intend to continue with this non-cash item in future years to more accurately reflect the financial position of the club.

Some expenditure has risen sharply as a result of increased attendances at home games eg. Cleaning from \$3,818 to \$5,417. Electricity and gas rose to \$7,457 from \$3,478, boosted by the Juniors training Friday nights followed by the Golden Gallopers. Such costs have to be met from the Juniors contribution.

Referee payments were introduced for the first time in 2005 and led to a big improvement in the quality of refereeing.

Balance Sheet

A pleasing aspect of our financial performance is the improved balance sheet.

Comparison with 2004 figures show Current Assets improving from \$17,148 to \$36,685 while Current Liabilities actually fell slightly from \$32,043 to \$31,054. And our total loans outstanding fell from \$13,504 to \$3,454. Both loans will be extinguished during 2006.

Outlook

The 2005 results are pleasing because they reflected the efforts of many. The players took responsibility for their own club to a degree not seen for years. Post match clean-ups, tent pull downs, half time entertainment, Ladies days, BBQ and canteen volunteers meant the Committee could confidently organise bigger home day events in the knowledge that it would not have to be the Club President emptying the bins at midnight (although he still did it).

This pride in their club is attracting players from other clubs and is making Colts recruitment an easier task. Potential players know they will have fun at Jeeps.

Correctly managed this culture will create a long term financial benefit in terms of subscriptions, home game crowds, sponsorship and support of functions.

Summary

In summary I would like to thank Paul Reid for his wise counsel and great support over the past year and to wish him the best for the future. Those of us on the committee are in awe of the tasks he performs behind the scenes with good humour and little fuss. Rod Torkington has guided us through a difficult period financially and uses a great deal of commonsense and experience to ensure the inevitable cashflow crises are successfully navigated.

Ellen Godfrey has assisted me with bookkeeping and accounting tasks and it is comforting to have reliable data provided in a timely fashion.

Finally thank you to the 2005 Committee who have provided great support in abiding by the budget and moving the club into a strong financial position.

NOTE 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Queensland. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Queensland and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AAS 3 Accounting for Income Tax
- AAS 5 Materiality
- AAS 8 Events Occurring After Reporting Date
- AAS 17 Accounting for Leases

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report is prepared, on a cash basis whereby items are brought into account as money is paid or received, from the records of the association.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Fixed Assets

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity and that this special purpose financial report should be prepared in accordance with the accounting policies outlined in Note 1 to the financial statements.

In the opinion of the committee the financial report as set out above:

1. Presents fairly the financial position of GPS Old Boys Rugby Union Club Inc. as at 30 September 2005 and its performance for the year ended on that date.

At the date of this statement, there are reasonable grounds to believe that GPS Old Boys Rugby Union Club Inc. will be able to pay its debts as and when they fall due.

Scope

We have audited the financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of GPS Old Boys Rugby Union Club Inc. for the year ended 30 September 2005 as set out above. The committee is responsible for the financial report and has determined that the accounting policies used and described in Note 1 to

the financial statements which form part of the financial report, are appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Queensland and are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. We have conducted an independent audit of this financial report in order to express an opinion on it to the members of GPS Old Boys Rugby Union Club Inc. No opinion is expressed as to whether the accounting policies used are appropriate to the needs of the members.

The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Queensland. We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial report to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

Our audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report and the evaluation of significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 so as to present a view which is consistent with our understanding of the Association's financial position, and performance as represented by the results of its operations and its cash flows. These policies do not require the application of all Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements in Australia.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

Audit Opinion

In our opinion, the financial report presents fairly subject to the following qualification in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial position of GPS Old Boys Rugby Union Club Inc. as at 30 September 2005 and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

Due to the nature of the income of GPS Old Boys Rugby Union Club Inc. and the limited resources available to the association to implement adequate internal controls over areas such as cash income it is impracticable to verify that all funds due to the Association were received however we have no reason to believe that all monies of the Association were not received and banked.
